The Seven Sacraments of the Armenian Church

Chrismation or Confirmation

Now it is God who makes both us and you stand firm in Christ. He anointed us, set His seal of ownership on us, and put His Spirit in our hearts as a deposit, guaranteeing what is to come. 2 Corinthians 1:21-22

The Sacrament of Chrismation, also called Confirmation, is always done in the Armenian Apostolic Church following Baptism. In Armenian we call it “Droshm” or “Knunq”. It is the sacrament of sealing by the Holy Spirit which the Neophyte (newly baptized person) receives after his/her Baptism.

During Chrismation we use Holy Muron which is the symbol of the Holy Spirit and an important component of the Sacraments. Muron is a Greek word which means perfumed or sweet-smelling oil. Holy Muron is usually blessed by the Catholicos of all Armenians once every seven years in the Mother See of Holy Etchmiadzin. The main component of Holy Muron is olive oil mixed with 40 different kinds of flowers and roots. During the blessing of the oil and added ingredients, all of the clergy present pray with His Holiness asking for the graces of the Holy Spirit to descend from Heaven and bless the ingredients. They are added into the cauldron one at a time and the lid is sealed. The cooking process will take three full days, during which time, the cauldron is constantly attended to by the monks and deacons of the Brotherhood of Holy Etchmiadzin. As the fire below the cauldron cooks the ingredients, the clergy stand a 24-hour vigil and offer their continuous prayers. When the cooking process comes to an end, the mixture is allowed to rest for three full days. During this time, the cauldron is never left unattended and is always accompanied by the prayers and psalms of the priests and deacons. Finally, the mixture is strained and prepared for the actual blessing of the Holy Muron. On the last day, a portion of the old Holy Muron is added to the mixture which confirms the continuity of the Holy Muron from the past to the present. Holy Muron is the symbol of unity for Armenians all over the world, which means that the Holy Spirit is the One who connects us all.



During Chrismation the priest anoints the nine parts of the Neophyte and says a special prayer for each part of the body. After that the Neophyte becomes the adopted child of God.

Dear faithful, each time we participate in the Baptism and Chrismation of a person (child or adult) let us pray and ask God to send the gifts of the Holy Spirit to those who are being baptized and sealed with Holy Muron. Amen.

Financial:

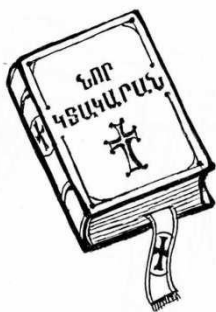
- Cheltenham Township has advised that the bridge on Ashmead Rd at Tacony Drive will be replaced within the next two-three years. In addition the two natural gas transmission companies feeding the storage/delivery stations (across the street and next door) will have to relocate their transmission lines that run under the bridge. Specter, the one across the street, approached us with an offer for an easement to run their underground pipeline under our property, but their financial offer was way too low to be considered so we rejected it. The Council will meet in September to determine what offer we would consider acceptable. Transco, the company next door, will begin their pipeline relocation in September and we negotiated a \$1,000 donation from them to have their employees use the back of our lot for their personal vehicles for the month.
- The investment committee has expanded from 3 to 5 to handle the endowments.

Building Management & Rentals

- Our maintenance and upgrades continue. The front light underground wiring system was replaced. A maintenance contract was initiated for the air conditioning systems. Our annual fire extinguisher updates took place. We have a water seepage in the dome that drips (pours may be a better word) on the first pew when we have hurricanes. This will be addressed this month. The Sunday School rooms were re-furbished as noted below.
- Hall rentals will meet budget this year, but we have no backlog for next year, yet. We had a very fancy affair in July. They held their service in the picnic area; had a horse and carriage bring in the bride; and did a fabulous decorating job in the hall and foyer. The Council has approved the use of the hall for Baptisms by voting members for a reduced fee plus the custodian as required.

Membership

- Membership dues and stewardship are behind last year. A letter was sent to past members to remind them. Your quarterly contribution statements that go out in October will be a follow-up reminder. It is important that we grow both spiritually and numerically.



Spiritual & Educational

- Our Sunday School term began with registration on September 11. Nancy Hovnanian, our new Superintendent and our teachers have developed new programs for the students. At Nancy's request we refurbished the Sunday School rooms with newly painted walls and ceilings, white boards, new lighting, new carpet as required, and ceiling fans.
- Der Hayr has kept busy visiting parishioners as well as baptizing and marrying many newcomers (he had one open day in July).
- Bible study for both adults and young adults continues
- Two partial scholarships were given for camp

Social Services (events) & Technology

- The picnic was held indoors and was successful
- We will have a 45th Anniversary event in November (see write up) and of course, our Bazaar in October.
- Our web-site has been updated to make it more user friendly and to provide more information. We have also incorporated E-Blasts so we can advise of any emergencies or other vital information.

My trip to Armenia through the Fuller Center for Housing program* was a trip to remember. All in all, the trip was amazing and I couldn't have asked for a better first trip to Armenia!

Anne Terkanian Honored in Gyumri

The most recent distribution of stipends of the Children of Armenia Sponsorship Program (CASP) in Gyumri was also an opportunity to honor one of CASP's most dedicated volunteers: Ms. Anne Terkanian.

Ms. Terkanian is a member of the Women's Guild Central Council, which runs CASP. She serves on the CASP Board, whose members include two other dedicated volunteers: Ms. Lucy Murad and Ms. Tanya Bukucuyan.

During the distribution in Gyumri this month, 90 children received stipends, which will help cover educational, health, and other expenses for these most underprivileged children of Armenia.

Ms. Terkanian relayed to the children the support of CASP donors from around the world. "In addition to my own children, I have over 1,000 kids whom I keep in my heart," she said.

My summer at St. Nersess (by Skye Jilajian)

This summer I spent two-and-a-half weeks at St. Nersess Armenian Seminary. First, I attended the Junior High session as a counselor for my first time. During this week, I helped plan fun activities and be a part of running the different events and classes throughout each day. Brenda Jilajian, one of many guests, came to make prayer boxes with everyone. When my session came, I was more than excited to see all my friends, some that I haven't seen for as long as a year.

A normal day at Nersess consists of everything from Bible studies, to Armenian classes as well as a long relaxing free time. Chapel is twice a day, about fifteen minutes each time. This is your time to relax and become close with God. Not only is there chapel to help become closer with God, but a Bible study once a day where you discuss different topics about our Christian faith. Right after lunch everyone participates in clean-up. This is followed by a couple of hours of free time. Many kids play sports, take naps, play ping pong, and just hang out with friends.

Being a part of the High School session, one of our big events is going to Point Pleasant beach, leaving late morning and having lunch on the bus so that when we arrive, we can spend the rest of the day lying on the beach and swimming in the ocean. Before dinner we shower and get ready to walk the boardwalk with friends, play games and go on rides until it is time to head back to our home. By the end of the nine days spent at St. Nersess, it becomes your home. The friends that you meet become part of your family. This session we had 35 participants, all coming in as friends and leaving as a close knit family.

A Milestone for Our Vehapar

On Sunday, August 21, on the occasion of the 60th birthday of His Holiness Karekin II, the Supreme Patriarch and Catholicos of All Armenians, a Pontifical Prayer was offered at Holy Etchmiadzin. Primate of dioceses across Armenia, members of the Brotherhood of Holy Etchmiadzin, and the faithful asked God to protect Holy Etchmiadzin, and to continue to grant strength to His Holiness as he leads the Armenian Church and people.

In a congratulatory letter, Archbishop Khajag Barsamian wrote on behalf of the entire Eastern Diocese of the Armenian Church of America to convey fond wishes to Catholicos Karekin II.

His Holiness Karekin II was born in the village of Voskehat in 1951. He entered the seminary of Holy Etchmiadzin in 1965, and was ordained to the Holy Priesthood in 1972. He was elected the 132nd Supreme Patriarch and Catholicos of All Armenians on October 27, 1999.

My Pilgrimage to the Holy Land

June 2011 embarked a once in a lifetime experience for me; it was my first trip to the Holy Land – Jerusalem. It was absolutely the most heartfelt and spiritual trip of my life thus far. I was very honored to have taken part as a pilgrim, walking in the footsteps of Christ, with Archbishop Khajag Barsamian, Primate of the Eastern Diocese. Our group of about 40 Armenian churchgoers age 19-26 flew out of Newark and had a direct flight into Tel Aviv where we all anxiously awaited the start to an amazing trip to come.

We gathered together at 8 am the first morning in Jerusalem and took part in the beginning of our memorable trip. We all participated in Badarak at the Church of the Virgin Mary. This church houses the tomb of the Virgin Mary located underneath the Armenian altar. After Badarak, we then went to see the Garden of Gethsemane. Here, Jesus prayed before His arrest directly following the betrayal of Judas. It is said that Jesus was praying so hard that he began to sweat blood! We then visited the Church of All Nations, which housed the actual rock that Jesus had prayed upon right before His arrest. We then went to the Mt. of Olives where Jesus had ascended into heaven. Shortly after, we went to see the Church of the Pater Noster, also called the Church of the Lord's Prayer. Here, the Lord's Prayer is written in a total of 169 different languages. They were all written on ceramic tiles covering all over the walls of the church. I felt chills in my body once I saw the Hayr Mer (the Lord's Prayer in Armenian). Shortly after we walked through the entire church, we then went to the "Dominus Fleuit" or "Jesus Wept" Church. This is the place where Jesus cried for Jerusalem.

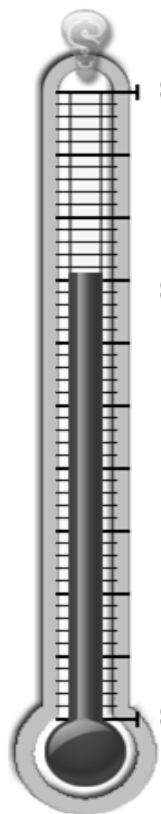
What had just been said in the preceding paragraph was only Day 1 of our trip! As you can tell, our days were jam-packed with tons of site seeing. I recall our Armenian tour guide saying that what we did in half of a day is what most people complete in 2 days! Our next day of site seeing was filled with some fun by going into Palestine and seeing where the Dead Sea Scrolls were found at Qumran. We were also able to go swimming in the Dead Sea. We had many leadership discussions and Bible readings every day at many of the different locations in the Holy Land. I must say that the most memorable part of my trip to the Holy Land was on our 4th day. We had gone to the Church of the Holy Sepulchre and to Bethlehem. At 4 am that morning, Badarak was preformed at this church in which the Tomb of Christ is held. Once you enter the church, you can't help but get emotional; I believe just about every member of our group shed a tear. The feelings you get while being in there are unexplainable. Not only is there the Tomb of Christ, but there are also many Armenian paintings, mosaics, and altars inside the church. On this same day, we also went to Bethlehem to visit the Church of the Nativity. There in the Grotto sits the Star of Bethlehem where Jesus is said to have been born. During our journey, we also did many other things like visit His Beatitude Archbishop Torkom Manoogian, Armenian Patriarch of Jerusalem. We visited the Armenian Quarter, the Vank, the Seminary, the Church of Saints James, and also had many social events with the local Armenian kids of Jerusalem. As well, we also went to the Wailing Wall and the Dome of the Rock.



The Armenians have such a huge presence throughout the Holy Land - it makes me feel so proud to be an Armenian! I truly feel that every Armenian needs to visit Jerusalem in his/her lifetime. Jerusalem changed me spiritually and has humbled me greatly. If you ever doubt your faith, go to the Holy Land. You can feel the Lord's presence everywhere you go - He is with you always! This was truly a trip of a lifetime and I would like to take this moment to thank Rev. Fr. Hakob Gevorgyan for giving me the honor of being selected to represent Holy Trinity Armenian Apostolic Church.

Just Another Day At The Office For Our Choir and Deacon Members



A Meditation by Deacon Albert Keshgegian

*Madik arr Der yev arek uzlooys.
Draw near to the Lord and take the light.
-- Hymn of Communion*

The phrase above is one of my favorites from the Divine Liturgy (Soorp Badarak). It is from the hymn that is sung just before Confession and Communion, when the curtain is closed and the people are coming forward to the altar.

What is this light that the hymn is talking about? Of course it is the light of God in the context of the body and blood of Christ that we receive in Communion. The idea of God as light occurs a number of times in the Gospels. The beginning of the Gospel of John speaks of Christ as the "true light that enlightened every man. This light shines in the darkness and the darkness has not overcome it" (Jn. 1:4b-5). Later in the Gospel of John Jesus also says about himself "I am the light of the world; he who follows me will not walk darkness, but will have the light of life" (Jn. 8:12).

We all know how important light is for us. The first thing we do when we walk into a dark room is flick on the light switch. The sun gives us light and warmth so that we won't freeze and so that we can see outdoors and so plants can grow and provide food for us.

But the light that this hymn and the Gospel of John speak about is different. It's not like a light bulb or the sun, which give us physical light. This is light that gives life to our souls. God's light draws us into the warmth of his kingdom. God lights the eyes of our souls to show us the way to do good deeds, to do the work of God. When we have God's light, our souls will never walk in darkness. When we have God's light, we will not stumble or fall or get lost. We see clearly the path leading to our goal, which is life forever with God.

God is in a battle with Satan for our souls --a battle of light versus darkness and ignorance, a battle of good versus evil and sin. But we know that God has already won that battle. We know because we see the power of Christ in his many miracles. We also see the power of Christ in the greatest miracle of all, his resurrection, when he defeated death and Satan.

How can we share in Christ's light and have our eyes opened to the way to go to God? The next line of that same hymn is another of my favorites and it answers this question:

*Jashagetzek yev desek zi kaghtsr eh Der.
O taste and see that the Lord is sweet.*

Who doesn't like something sweet? Cakes, pies, ice cream, chocolate candies. But the sweetest tasting of all is Christ in Communion --taking Christ himself within us, tasting his love, tasting of his power to perform miracles and to give us eternal life.

Every week Christ calls us to a banquet. He calls us through his boundless love and through this beautiful hymn. The main course of the banquet is mentioned in an earlier line of the same hymn:

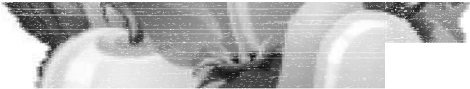
*Zmarmin yoor dah mez geragoor.

The main course is the sweet taste of Christ himself. And the dessert? The dessert is the hope of eternal life in the joy of heaven. How could we say no?

A Pilgrimage and A Wedding

As a bit of a backstory, this August, about twenty-five Philadelphians - including mostly Holy Trinity parishioners and our Der Hakob - traveled to Yerevan for Dr. Garo Garibian and his bride Cece's wedding. It would include a full week of site seeing leading up to the wedding celebration on Friday, August 12.

For many of the travelers, it was our first time to the motherland. As a first timer myself, I was "prepped" and advised throughout the months leading up to the trip. All of the recounts and impressions varied, depending on when the person had traveled, but everyone was in unity over one thing - I would love it.

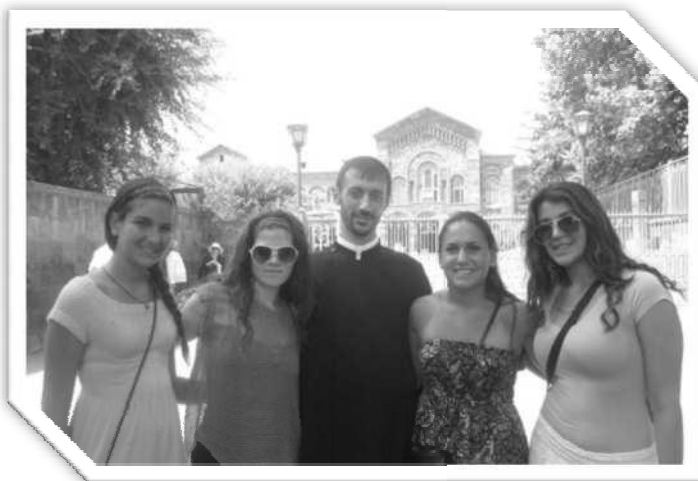
So with no expectations (except that it would need to be the most incredible experience of my life), I packed my bags (which didn't actually arrive in Armenia) and left. In appropriate fashion, we started the trip with a traditional Armenian dinner and kef night. For the non-Armenians on the trip, this evening full of copious vodka genatzs, more food than we could imagine and live Armenian music and dancing set the tone for the rest of the week.

Although we were all on this voyage for a celebration (and celebrate we did), we were also there to visit many sites and learn about the history and significance to our heritage and religion. For brevity sake, I won't provide a detailed recap of each journey, but to highlight: we attended Badarak at Holy Echmiadzin, visited several churches and monasteries, ate many feasts, and toured meaningful landscapes such as Lake Sevan. We were lucky enough to experience special additions, including a trip to the Turkish border at Arax River, a dinner feast graciously prepared for us by Yeretzgin Ana, Diramayr and Dirahayr, renewal of wedding vows in the Saghmosavank Monastery at Amberd, and our own Fran Torcomian's confirmation into the Armenian Church at Kohr Virap.



In spite of some warnings I received, I did not encounter too many "developing country" foibles. I never personally felt unsafe and we weren't hassled by beggars or cons. George Terkanian - who we coincidentally nicknamed "Chief of L & I" - can fill you in on his infrastructure and mechanical concerns.

Every single thing was beautiful. The landscapes, the views of Ararat, the churches, stonework, fruits and vegetables, the people. Even in dolor and solemnity, we could find beauty. Our visit to Mer Doon, the post-Orphanage home for women, was beautiful because of the warmth and love these girls were capable of sharing in spite of their hardships. Similarly, we saw beauty at the Tsiternakaberd Armenian Genocide Monument and Museum in the way that this tragic event in our history was displayed and memorialized.



The emotion I felt most powerfully throughout the trip was pride. Pride in a patriotic sense, for Armenia. Proud to be an Armenian; that several roots of Christianity stem from our ancestral home; that we survived many attacks to defend our religion; that we maintained our culture in spite of opposition; and even that the non-Armenians on the trip recognized these traits and were captivated throughout our journey.

To exemplify, I think it is appropriate to quote the words of Cece's son Jared about the visit to Echmiadzin:

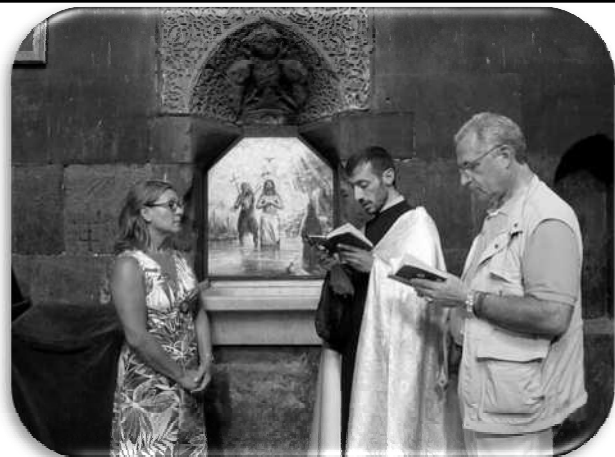
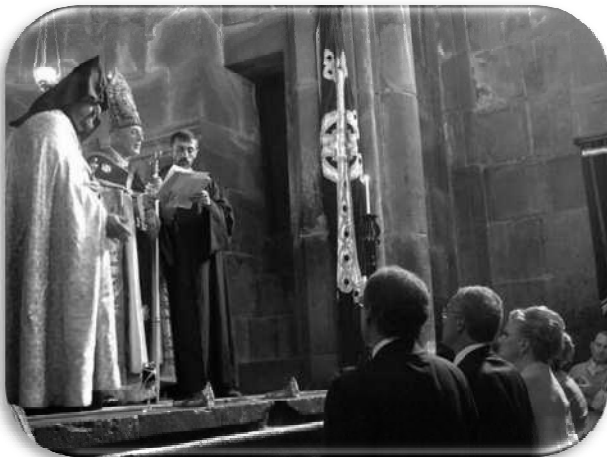
Today, Sunday, we started our day by going to mass at a church that Jesus himself would have been proud of. Architecture is immediately noticeable, and the church was the prime example. While I am not the most religious of men, I am no stranger to understanding things that are important and prevalent in the creation of this crazy world we live in. It matters, and everything we saw mattered. A museum followed with treasures that words cannot describe.

In closing, below I leave you with my recipe for a successful trek to Hayastan. Fortunately for us, we were blessed with all of the ingredients:

- A vibrant and quirky group of travelers to keep it funny and interesting;
- A trip leader named Garo Garibian who knows just about everyone in the country including all of the clergy at each site you visit;
- A tour guide and bus driver that know the country inside and out so that you don't miss a beat while you arrive safely at each destination;
- The priest from your own parish to enforce your sense of community and pilgrimage and to pray with you at each significant location;
- A tolerance for heat, since your air conditioned bus will be set at 85 degrees (on a good day);
- A wedding with ten clergy, local pop stars, and overflowing love to culminate the pilgrimage;
- And of course, energy, a thirst for exploration and faith so that you can appreciate the experience in a meaningful way.



Even though these few words do not begin to illustrate what an inspiring and amazing occasion it was for me, everyone was right, I loved it.

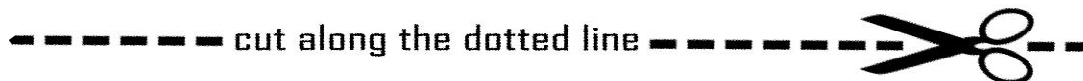

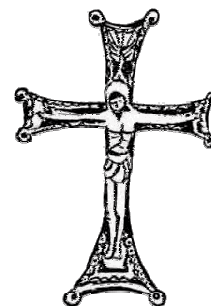
