The mission of the Armenian Apostolic Orthodox Church is to preach the Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ and to proclaim its message of salvation. This mission is realized through worship, education, witness, service, and a common life in Christ as expressed in the distinctive faith- experience of the Armenian people. All the faithful of the Armenian Church—both clergy and laity—are called to participate fully in this mission.

Admitting Our Wrongdoings

This topic is the most unpleasant for many because people don't like to talk about it for different reasons. Some people think they don't sin and they are sinless. Others think, it is not necessary to think or talk about it.

First of all, we should know that we all are sinners. The only person who lived in this world and didn't sin is Jesus Christ. It is necessary for us to think about our sins and confess them to God, because that way our wrongdoings will be clearer to us and we can work to minimize them.

Sin is not only to steal or to kill. There are many visible and invisible sins in our daily life, for example, pride, envy, anger, sloth, covetousness, gluttony, lust, rudeness, lies, gossip; and this list can be continued. We should be alert for our actions, not only sometimes but all the time, because it is very easy to make a mistake but very hard to fix it.

If the mechanic doesn't see the problem or the damage on the car, how can he fix it? God wants us to see our problems and shortcomings. We sometimes have to go deeper and find out the cause of that problem. We should be open to learn about ourselves because it can only help us to improve and live a better life.



When a child does something wrong, immediately he tries to justify his action. Very often we do the same thing. If we are right in our actions and someone criticizes us, then we should justify ourselves. There is no question about that, but if we are wrong, the best thing to do is to admit our wrong action and apologies.

We live and learn from our mistakes. All the time, we try to improve our physical life by exercising, eating healthy food, drinking lots of water or liquid, taking vitamins.... the list can go on and on. We need the same improvement for our spiritual life. Our physical life here on earth can last a maximum of 100 years or more, but our soul will live forever. This should tell us something.

Sleeping is good and necessary for us, but we can't sleep all the time. If, in our spiritual life, we don't take our wrongdoings or our sins seriously, then we put ourselves in a deep sleep.

The saints and the church fathers talk about their sins and wrongdoings very often. They didn't talk about it by accident or in vain, but for a specific reason.

St. Nersess Shnorhali says in his prayer, Uncreated Nature, "I have sinned against you in my thoughts, with my soul and body. Remember not my previous sins for the sake of your holy name. Have mercy upon your creatures, and upon me, great sinner that I am."

"Seer of all, I have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed. Erase the record of my transgressions, and write my name in the book of life. Have mercy upon your creatures, and upon me, great sinner that I am."

St. Gregory of Narek says, "... I shall lament from the bottom of my invisible soul the sins I have committed. You are able, compassionate God, to perform a miracle with your everlasting might saying, 'Be healed of your soul's torment' or 'May your sins be forgiven' or 'Go in peace. You are cleansed of sin."

Dear Parishioners, it would be spiritually enriching for us to examine ourselves and be aware of our sins, confess them to God and repent now. God is a loving and forgiving God and when He sees that we sincerely repent; He will forgive us because God reads our hearts.

Parish Council News

The year ended just okay on the financial side of things. We made many repairs and replacements for our now-aged Church building. Taking into account the Hovnanian Foundation contribution, we ended up ahead about \$60,000 and without that contribution, we ended up in the red about \$30,000. This need for repairs will continue, but I'm not asking for money in this issue, at least not directly.

In this issue, I am explaining why we are publishing our list of Members, which of course, translates into listing the people who pay their dues. It seems to be a sensitive issue. I don't know why. It is \$260.00 for regular membership dues. We can afford it, yes. I don't believe those who say otherwise and if you really can't afford it, we should waive it, but nobody should be voluntarily coming to Church, taking the benefits and not contributing to the costs. We aren't saying you need to pay thousands of dollars a year, but where else do you go where you go into a building, avail yourself of the resources for two or three hours and leave without paying?



I don't have a judgment. I am far, far, far from a perfect individual, but it is not a judgment to say that you should pay for what you get from an organization and at a minimum, you should pay the minimum for what you get. The minimum is \$260.00 per year. For that \$260.00, you get a warm or cool building, a Sunday School, a Choir, an incredibly presented religious service and maybe a cup of coffee, but most importantly, you get to practice your religion with a group of incredibly qualified and capable individuals and be surrounded with equally wonderful people who share your thousands of years of history.

Eh, maybe I do have a judgment and Der Hayr will tell me that is wrong, but my Mom-Mom raised me to be the first one at the bar putting money down to pay, to always reach for a check at dinner, to appear as if you could pay for whatever you needed no matter what, never to ask anyone for help to pay for things, and most importantly, she told me, "Mooshig, when someone put some candy out for free, you look and see how much candy the person take. If they take just one, they are good person with good insides. If they put their hand in and take more, they are like animal."

Can we stop with this notion that the Church owes us a free Church, \$20.00 steak dinners, free bagels and coffee; and please, each of us, reach in and pay for what we take from the Church. If people don't pay, those who do pay are paying for you to enjoy the Church; they are picking up your check each week. If a person is okay with allowing someone else to pay for them, and sometimes their entire family, to enjoy the benefits of our Church, I am okay with "not" listing their names as Members.

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A Reflection on Palm Sunday By Deacon Albert Keshgegian

It was an "add on," something extra that would be nice to do during our quick New York escape to see a Broadway show ("Pretty Woman," great show). The next morning we went to see the Armenia! exhibit at the Metropolitan Museum of Art. But the exhibit was spectacular. Pieces from museums in Etchmiadzin, Yerevan, Jerusalem, and other places, some never seen before in the United States, a once-in-a-lifetime collection of Armenian art, mainly religious, from the fourth to the seventeenth centuries. Religious objects included illuminated manuscripts, khatchkars, objects holding relics of saints or a sliver of the true Cross, objects used in the church, and ornate, remarkably well-preserved, vestments.

Especially moving for me was a room devoted to the churches at Lake Sevan in Armenia. There are two very close to each other and they are particularly meaningful for me. One of them is Soorp Arakelotz (Church of the Holy Apostles), similar to my middle name of Arakel, and one of the names for the other church is Soorp Garabed, my father's name. I had visited there twice and the photographs of the churches showing in the exhibit were immediately familiar, stirring my memories of the previous visits. Also, too, that exhibit room had music, with moving hymns from the Badarak.

As I looked around the room I saw it - a very ornate, intricately carved wooden door that had been the door of Soorp Arakelotz. The top panel presents Christ in glory surrounded by the four beasts of the Apocalypse. Below are St. John the Baptist, Mary the Mother of God, St. Stephen the First Martyr, and St. Gregory the Illuminator. In the Pentecost scene below them, the Holy Spirit descends as a dove with God's message to the twelve seated apostles. At the base and around the frame are designs similar to those on khatchkars.

This didn't look just like a door to a church; it made me think of the door to heaven itself!

On Palm Sunday, several ideas of a door or gate come together. On that day, we celebrate the triumphant entry of Jesus into Jerusalem, through the gates of the city. We're also at the beginning or doorway into Holy Week, culminating in Easter, when Jesus gave us the promise of eternal life. Palm Sunday is also at the end of Great Lent, where the lessons of the Sundays of Lent end with the idea of Christ's second coming, the Day of Judgment, and the gates of heaven being opened for those who are allowed to go through into heaven, also sometimes called the New Jerusalem.

And so, on Palm Sunday, the Armenian Church has the service of Turnpatzek, or Opening of the Doors, when we think about the Day of Judgment and God's kingdom and ask to be allowed to enter. In the earliest Church, the service started outside of Jerusalem and they would knock on the gates of the city. Later, it took place at the actual door of the church, with the priest knocking on the front door. (In more modern times, the service takes place at the altar curtain, and a wooden gavel is used to strike a piece of wood, symbolically representing knocking on the door.) I could just see a succession of clergymen, over the years and centuries, knocking on that wooden door at Lake Sevan for the Turnpatzek service.

During that service, we ask that the door to heaven be opened for us, as we sing, "Open to us, open to us O Lord, the door of your mercy we ask with a lamenting voice" (echoing Psalm 118:19). Why is the door a door of mercy? Because none of us deserves to go through it; we can do so only because of God's forgiveness and mercy, for which we should continually ask God.

Let us also not forget that although we talk about a door to heaven and knock on the door of the church, the true door to heaven is Christ himself. As he said, "I am the gate...whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture" (John 10:9). Only by following Christ, living by his teachings, striving to be like him, becoming one of his own, will we reach God's heavenly kingdom.



OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD

This year marks the 25th anniversary since Samaritan's Purse created the Operation Christmas Child program, with our church participating for more than half of those years – 14 to be exact! And since the beginning, Samaritan's Purse has shipped out more than 157 million shoebox gifts to children in countries all over the globe, including Armenia. There are well over 5,000 drop-off locations across the country where shoeboxes are delivered.

To share some interesting "fun facts," the church we use for dropping off our boxes took in over 5,600 shoeboxes this year, more than ever before – and they've been collecting shoeboxes for years. The Bucks County Team (the County where the church is located) collected more than 27,700 shoeboxes. It is staggering to think of those numbers - in just one Pennsylvania County – all being donated by people who wish to share the love of Jesus to children around the world. (Accompanying pictures show the church where our shoeboxes are delivered.)



By filling 54 shoeboxes this year, we did our small part to help this effort. This year we reached a total of 990 filled shoeboxes since we began in 2005. We thank those people who filled shoeboxes this year – some of them more than one box and many of them doing it year after year. We also thank those who, though they were unable to fill a shoebox, were still a part of this project by making a monetary contribution to support it.

This effort, which now falls under the umbrella of Adult Christian Education (ACE), exists because of all who are willing to step up and reach out to the "least of these" by filling one or more shoeboxes. If you are one of those, delight in the knowledge of how you have brightened a child's life in a faraway country.

"But since you excel in everything.....see that you also excel in this grace of giving." (2 Cor. 8:7)











The truly enduring reality, however, in good times and bad, has been the faith and decency of the Armenian people. The world saw and acknowledged those virtues this year. May God reward those same virtues with progress and prosperity, for all

this year. May God reward those same virtues with progress and prosperity, for all our people, in the years to come.

The church resounded with cheers and applauses. Afterwards the guests enjoyed a lavish reception catered by parents of the Church School and the faithful of the church.



Criteria for Scholarship Awards Youth Programs of the Diocese of the Armenian Church

- 1. An application must be submitted to the pastor at least four weeks prior to the program.
- 2. The applicant, or at least one parent of the applicant, must be a dues-paying member of the parish for at least one year.
- 3. The applicant must be a baptized member of the Armenian Church.
- 4. The applicant must be enrolled in the Sunday school or a member of the ACYOA.
- 5. An applicant may not receive more than one scholarship in any given year.
- 6. Should there be more than one applicant from the same family, a graduated scale will be used to determine the amount of each scholarship.
- 7. At the completion of the program, the applicant must submit an essay on "What I Learned at (specific program)."
 The parish reserves the right to use the essay or excerpts from the essay in its publications.
- 8. The amount of the scholarship will be determined by the Pastor and Parish Council.
- 9. Scholarships will be awarded according to the availability of funds.
- 10. Call the office for an application.

Not only has David Murray opened a new and delightful restaurant in Cherry Hill, NJ, within the last four months, but he has incorporated "Outreach With A Twist." David and Stacy knew they wanted to give back to the community, so they decided to offer free dessert to anyone who donated a pair of jeans to their restaurant, either new or gently used.



Inspired by a national effort called Teens for Jeans, the idea was to collect clothing to aid homeless young people. Through a friend, Stacy learned of Joseph's Fund of Camden and Joseph's House, a counseling center and homeless shelter that regularly accommodates up to 88 overnight guests.

And so began the process of collecting "denim" jeans to tie into their restaurant's name! And what a success it has become. In a very short time, they collected 270 pairs of jeans, ranging in sizes from children up through size 54. Together with their children, Tavit and Spencer, the Denim Bistro owners arrived at the Joseph Fund shelter at 6:30 on a very rainy morning to deliver their trunkload of jeans. And the young Murray boys did not have to be dragged out of bed – they were that excited!

David and Stacy felt it was important for their sons to see for themselves the great need that exists so close to home. Chef David added, "We want to make them aware of issues globally and locally, to make them see not everyone is as fortunate as we are."

David said his offer of "dessert for jeans" will continue as long as they can make a difference. So stop by the restaurant with a pair of jeans, enjoy a delicious meal and get a free dessert. Your stomach will thank you and so will your heart!

January Designated as Family Worship Month

Under Fr. Hakob's leadership, our Church School and our Adult Christian Education ministry joined forces to present a month of educational opportunities for children and adults designed to enrich understanding of the faith. The sacred space of our sanctuary became a classroom, and everyone was invited.

For two Sundays in January (a third program was cancelled due to weather conditions—see note at end of article), the faithful experienced a "Simultaneous Translation" of selected sharagans (hymns) from the Divine Liturgy and an "Instructed Liturgy" which provided commentary on the worship service.

On January 13, while our choir sang acapella, Dn. Albert Keshgegian translated the words of several hymns from the Badarak. One of our parishioners commented, "I was especially moved by a few of the words in the Kiss of Peace hymn [Holy greeting is commanded. This church has now become one soul, the kiss is given for a full bond, and love is spread over us all.] I think that describes our parish; anyway that's how I feel as a member of this Body."

On January 27, Garen and Diana Boghosian, who are devoted Church School parents (Diana is also a Church School teacher), provided instruction designed to increase our knowledge of the Badarak. The Liturgy was interrupted in progress several times for an explanation of the words, actions and symbolism of worship. This was our parish's third presentation of the Instructed Liturgy since 2013, and once again, attendance confirmed the value of the program.

A special feature of the month was the Liturgy "worksheets," which worshippers received as they entered the narthex. Children, working with parents, and adults, eager to test their knowledge, were challenged to answer questions on the Liturgy, occasionally using the Pew Book and the Bible for assistance. For example, "What do we do when Der Hayr blesses us?" and "How many times do we say the words 'We believe' during the Creed?" Some questions were a bit more difficult: "Put these in the order in which they occur: communion, confession, kissing the Gospel, Der Voghormia." Other questions provided a chuckle, like "True or False: At the end of Liturgy, we stand in line to kiss the Pew Book."

Please SAVE THE DATE: On Sunday, March 31, Fr. Hakob will use his sermon time to serve as our "tour guide" providing commentary on the icons and stained-glass windows that adorn our sanctuary. Safety & Emergency Planning

Beginning in March 2018 and continuing up to the present, the Parish Council has been working with Safety & Emergency Planning personnel from Cheltenham Township and Montgomery County. In addition, the Eastern Diocese has requested that we develop an Active Shooter Plan.

We have been reviewing building security, door hardware, emergency communications, and several evacuation or "stay" options. Also, our parishioners will need to participate by having awareness to out-of-the-ordinary vehicles & pedestrians on the street and in our parking lot. As many of you have heard, the current buzzwords are "See Something, Say Something."



Drawings indicating all Exit Doors in the entire facility are being developed and will be put on display in various parts of the building. They will include a standard protocol (official procedure) for contacting 911.

Finally, during 2019, we will be scheduling a planned fire alarm evacuation of the Sunday School, and simulating an emergency event with testing of our communication systems. While we have no reason to believe there is any potential threat to our safety, the possibility exists and we must all plan and behave accordingly

SHNORHALI AND SCRIPTURE – Part 2

For three Tuesday mornings in November, parishioners gathered to explore the writings of St. Nersess Shnorhali, continuing a series that was started in the summer. The sessions were led by parish pastor Fr. Hakob along with Dr. Albert Keshgegian, who built the sessions around excerpts from his books My Lenten Journal and Beside Still Waters, as well as including additional material.

In the summer the group had examined prayers from Shnorhali's I Confess with Faith and Jesus the Son. In Part 2 the group continued with additional excerpts from Jesus the Son and examined verses from the saint's many hymns, including Aysor Anjar, Aravod Loosoh, and Norasdeghdzyal. These readings were augmented by Scriptural passages illustrating the inspiration Shnorhali received from the Bible.

Participants reflected on the writings, shared their reactions, and considered how Shnorhali's profound spirituality can impact their personal faith. One commented, "I certainly learned to appreciate [Shnorhali's] contribution to not only the Armenian Church but even more importantly to the entire Christian faith."





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CHURCH SCHOOL

The fall months "Back to Basics" program under the directorship of Nancy Basmajian has been a good learning experience for everyone. Two of the very successful experiences for our students have been serving as acolytes and the class presentations during Badarak.

Students serve as Acolytes: Since October, we have noticed smiles on the faces of faithful as they enter the sanctuary and see boys and girls, ages 8 to 11, serving at the altar as acolytes. To date, 14 of our students in grades 3 to 5 have diligently held candles beside Fr. Hakob and assisted him at communion time. The "veterans" of the group, Michael Damerjian and Narek Gevorgyan, even served with the new Primate of our Diocese, Very Rev. Fr. Daniel Findikyan, when he celebrated Liturgy in November. Guiding the acolytes in this new endeavor is Deacon Greg Andonian who has been gently directing their movements, keeping an eye on their progress and assigning breaks from time to time. We have received positive comments from Fr. Hakob and our deacons regarding their participation in the Badarak as well as expressions of joy from parents and parishioners alike. Fr. Hakob is planning on a few training sessions with the acolytes in the coming months. Our current acolytes include the following students

Class Presentations: Students in three of our classes received applause and affirmation from parishioners on three separate Communion Sundays this fall for special presentations based on what they have been learning in their respective Christian education classrooms. Immediately after communion and before Fr. Hakob's sermon, each class shared a short lesson from their curriculum. In October, Leslie Movsesian's 4th and 5th graders recited a prayer from St. Gregory of Narek's "Speaking with God from the Depths of the Heart" and gave a brief biography of the greatest poet-mystic of the Armenian Church. Two of Merle Santerian's 7th grade students in November presented a re-wording of the Beatitudes from Christ's Sermon on the Mount, among his most profound teachings. After Liturgy, they distributed an acrostic puzzle based on the famous passage from the Gospel of Matthew and challenged congregants to test their knowledge. And finally in December, the 3rd grade students of Diana Bogosian and Stephanie Vartanian, who are team-teaching, amazed parishioners with their articulate and well-performed presentation called "A Family of Faith." From the formation of the church in the Book of Acts to our Mother Church in Etchmiadzin and to the establishment of Holy Trinity, they covered centuries of church history and also shared brief Bible passages on the church "where God's love rules!"

On December 1st students and parent chaperones from grades 4 through 11 went by bus to New York to see the Armenia Exhibit at the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Everyone had a wonderful time!

On December 16th the church School held its Annual Lunch with Santa after church. Over 150 students and adults attended. A

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PRIMATE'S VISIT CELEBRATES DEACONS AND CHOIR MEMBERS

On the occasion of his first pastoral visit to our parish as Diocesan Primate, Very Rev. Daniel Findikyan met with members of the parish leadership on Saturday, November 17th. The evening began with Evening Service, followed by a

light fellowship dinner and an informal questionand-answer session.

Although Fr. Daniel has visited our parish on numerous occasions for talks or celebrating Liturgy and is known to many of us, it was fascinating to learn more about him as a person. He was born in Fort Worth, Texas, to an Armenian father and German mother, grew up in New York State, and, as a teenager, was inspired and mentored by Rev. Kevork Arakelian, then pastor of the church in Binghamton, NY, ultimately leading him to enter the priesthood. Fr. Daniel has advanced degrees from several institutions and is an international scholar and expert on liturgy.

The new primate shared with us his assessment of the Eastern Diocese. Although it has had numerous successes over the years, there are also many continuing challenges, including budgets and human resources. Fr. Daniel's goal is for the Diocese to concentrate first and foremost on being the Church and focus on proclaiming the Gospel of



Jesus Christ as expressed in the distinctive faith-experience of the Armenian people. All present were inspired and energized by his vision and plans.

The weekend events continued on Sunday morning as the Divine Liturgy was celebrated by Fr. Daniel, followed by a celebratory banquet with nearly 250 in attendance who wanted to be a part of honoring so many whose years of service number in the many hundreds. During the course of the program, all honorees were gifted with beautifully designed plaques of Etchmiadzin and Mt. Ararat in recognition of their service.



Mistress of Ceremonies Marta Brann flawlessly directed the flow of the program which was interspersed throughout the dinner. Tom Torcomian shared remarks which included that the ongoing service given by the honorees makes them "true stewards of the church as much as those who donate their money." He ended his uplifting remarks with a "commercial" by reminding everyone that Badarak starts at 10:30 am on Sundays and that "sports fans wouldn't go to a game at the start of the second quarter!"

After welcoming the guests, Co-Chair Nadia Soghomonian read some of the many reflections that had been sent in by parishioners telling of how the service of the honorees, both in the choir and at the altar, helps to enhance the Liturgy.



Musical interlude was provided by Nune Darbinian, who delighted the audience with three piano selections, two of which were Armenian melodies, including the much loved and recognized Yerevani Siroon Aghchig

Co-Directors of the choir, Jeanette Der Hagopian and Karinne Andonian, each spoke briefly of their path to church service in the choir and their joy as they sing the magnificent Sharagans of our Divine Liturgy, which ultimately helped grow their faith in the process of service. Lorraine Damerjian was also recognized as the longest-serving organist of our church, still serving after forty-two years.

Following the Choir Directors, two of the most recent deacons ordained at our church, Gregory Andonian and Antranig Garibian, spoke of their appreciation in having reached the place where they can serve God at the altar of their beloved Holy Trinity. They shared the generous mentoring that they had received from the older deacons over the years, some of whom are no longer with us.



Special mention was expressed to lifelong members of the parish – Berj Yeretzian and Albert Kapeghian - both of whom are retired deacons and choir directors. Together they have devoted decades of service not only to our church, but also in our Diocese as Chairs of the former Choir Association of the Armenian Church, now known as the Sacred Music Council.

Rev. Fr. Hakob Gevorgyan, pastor of Holy Trinity, reflected that every Sunday Jesus Christ gives a great banquet and invites all of us to partake of it. He went on to say that our beautiful Badarak is enhanced because of the angelic voices of our choir members and dedication of our altar servers. He described them as humble, hardworking, well-organized and faithful people "who serve God not because they have to, but because they want to." Der Hayr added that the choir and altar servers "are an inspiration to me and to our people."



When our Primate addressed gathering, he began by sharing that many in the parish are friends he has made as a result of visiting often in years past to celebrate Badarak, preach and lecture; and had "great respect for the many servers who were so worthily honored today." He celebrated the honorees with their spirit of serving. He stated that "the message of Christian faith is that we are spiritually changed by acts of selfless service, which changes us from deep within." continued, "acts of service are love made visible - love and service go together." In closing, he added that "even if the motivation to do good is not right, we can learn that love changes everything."

As the banquet was drawing to a close, a well-kept surprise was revealed when the Primate called Deacon Albert Keshgegian to the dais where he was presented with the St. Nersess Shnorhali Medal and an

encyclical bestowed by His Holiness Karekin II, Supreme Patriarch and Catholicos of All Armenians, for his many decades of service and devotion to the Armenian Church. In addition to his service as an ordained deacon of the church, he is the author of four books on the Divine Liturgy and Christian spirituality. After Albert was over the great surprise of receiving this honor, he shared his thoughts by saying, "Serve the Lord with gladness. We owe everything to God. Everything that is good comes from God. He gave us everything and we owe tremendous gratitude to Him."

The banquet ended with the final benediction and thanks to all who made it such a success: Margo Silk, Nadia and Vache Soghomonian, Armena and Jim Keshgegian, Gloria Basmajian and Denise Sisian.....and with congratulations to all of the honorees.
