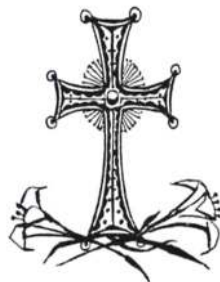

The mission of the Armenian Apostolic Orthodox Church is to preach the Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ and to proclaim its message of salvation. This mission is realized through worship, education, witness, service, and a common life in Christ as expressed in the distinctive faith- experience of the Armenian people. All the faithful of the Armenian Church – both clergy and laity – are called to participate fully in this mission.

LIFE CONTINUES...

Since the creation of this world mankind has been facing difficulties and disasters: pandemics, wars, earthquakes, floods and broken relationships, but life continues.

The year of 2020 will reluctantly stay in our memories. First, Covid-19 changed our lives and then the unexpected war in Artsakh brought more difficulties and stress to our nation worldwide. During the war and even after the war, we felt that life stopped for us. Day and night we were waiting to see how our small nation was going to protect its people and its borders. But the resources were incomparable; Azerbaijan and Turkey were fighting against our small nation. As a result of the 44-day war, we lost over 5,000 young men, we have over 10,000 wounded soldiers, and we lost 75% of our historic Artsakh, hopefully for only a short period of time.

After these heartbreaking results, some people think that we can't recover and others are hopeless. These two are not options for us Christians. Because Jesus said, "I have told you these things, so that in Me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world" (John 16:33).

Our enemies always want the same thing: to kill us and confiscate our land. And we have to make our decision that we are not going to give up; we are going to live and prosper. The enemy can kill the flesh but never can kill our spirit. Our nation had the Battle of Avarayr in 451, the Armenian Genocide in 1915, the Battle of Sardarabad in 1918, the Artsakh war in 1990s, and we saw the continuation of the same war in 2020... but we are still here. We should always remember that our people died to protect our homeland and our faith. And the wounded and refugees need our continued help.

We have to realize that our homeland is holy and every Armenian around the world should help to protect that holy place. Armenia is our identity.... it is the guarantor of our continuation as a nation.

Dear Faithful, despite the difficulties, our life continues and each one of us has a mission in this world. Let us "trust in the Lord with all our heart, and lean not on our own understanding. In all our ways acknowledge Him, and He will direct our paths" (Proverbs 3:5-6).

PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

I hope everyone is doing well. It seems things are "kind-of" headed into the direction of the old normal. We will see. Our Church attendance has been consistent at about 40 persons. We have been fortunate to receive contributions and other giving, sustaining us through this challenging time. Our Sunday School is back and attendance is climbing. Thank you all.

In September, December and January, the Diocese held their Diocesan Assembly. The three sessions were all virtual, but in the latter sessions, the Diocese utilized software to allow voting on the issues presented to the Delegates.

The Diocesan Assembly is a very valuable event. Sometimes, like school-age children, we lament those types of activities, but the reality is that attending the Diocesan Assembly is an incredibly valuable experience. When you first arrive at an Assembly, you are nearly overwhelmed by the number of Armenian faces and the amount of Clergy. An Assembly begins with the election of a Chairperson and then the Meeting is turned-over to Bishop Daniel for a prayer and opening remarks.

Having the opportunity to listen to Bishop Daniel speak about the current and future efforts and vision of the Church leaves me with an understanding of the organization as a whole and provides me with an appreciation of the level of work involved in the day-to-day operation of our Diocese. In the course of the Assembly, participants ask questions and appropriately challenge the administration of the Diocese in a healthy manner. Again, it is good to know the process exists and that each of us, in any leadership role within the Church organization is subject to review and that the actions of the organization are not just approved as a matter of course. I am always subject to the challenge of the members of our Parish and believe that any leader must welcome any challenge as a part of accepting a leadership role.

There is a "political" component to the Assembly as you see people lobbying support for different proposals they seek to present for a vote. That is interesting to observe. It is not my thing, but I respect those who engage in the process and understand the necessity. The Delegates bring forth an agenda from their respective Parishes and seek to implement change. That is how change happens. In the most recent Assembly, the Assembly voted to impose term limits for the persons acting as members of the Diocesan Council and for those persons acting as Delegates. Terms limits are seemingly always a good idea and we have them at the Parish level for membership on the Parish Council.

We are seeking to conduct our Parish Assembly in September of this year. Hopefully, it will be in-person, but we have a process for a virtual Assembly, if needed. During this time, our Parish Council will remain with the current members and new members will be elected in September.

On a personal note, thank you. Really, thank you. I have been a member of the Parish Council for now 12 years, In the first 6 years, I was Treasurer, a year off in-between serving as a Delegate, and then for the last 6 years, I have served as Chair. Thank you to my Uncle John too because if he had not "enlisted me to help ("Moosh, you have to do this with me"), I may not have had this opportunity to serve this Parish, work with Der Hayr and work with each of the different Parish Council members over the years. Each person, to a person, has been so kind to me and tolerant of whatever learning curve or gaps I may suffer or suffered. Our meetings are calm and respectful. That is Der Hayr's lead and my follow.

Please consider participating in Parish Council or any of the other organizations that run the engine of our Church. It matters.

POMEGRANATE BLESSING SERVICE

On the last Sunday of 2020, a traditional Pomegranate Blessing Service was conducted following Badarak. In the Armenian tradition, the pomegranate as a national symbol reflects the meaning of life, prosperity and abundance. In the Christian symbolism the pomegranate represents the blood shed by Jesus Christ, symbolizing also the Glorious Resurrection of our Lord and the diversity of God's grace. In the interpretations of our church fathers, the pomegranate is presented that the church members are as diverse as the granules of the pomegranate but the pomegranate is covered by a solid peel, all being united in one Church. This Service is meant to be conducted within thirty minutes of the start of a new year, but for the sake of practicality, we have been doing it on the last Sunday of the year, starting several years ago. At the end of the service, each family was given a pomegranate as a reminder, especially of the Christian significance.

SUPPORT FOR ARTSAKH

A team of seven donors from the East Coast (six of whom are our parishioners) have been taking part in a donation project to help families in the Aragatz region who have been affected by the Artsakh war in some way. Many families have lost their loved ones in battle or are facing permanent injuries, leading to a lack of income and support. Many of these families were living in poor and uncomfortable conditions with a lack of access to heat, clean water, and an overall difficulty with upkeep of their homes prior to the war. Der Hakob, Jeanette Der Hagopian and Garo Garibian had the opportunity to visit families in this region at different times in years 2016 and 2019.



Our small team has been sending money through Money Gram on a monthly basis SAFELY and DIRECTLY (no third party organization involved) to Bishop Mkrtych Proshyan, the bishop of the Aragatz region in Armenia. The money is sent to Bishop Proshyan and he personally delivers the funds to 30 families in the region, families whom he knows on a personal basis.

We have sent \$1,200 for each of two months, which means each family is receiving \$40 a month. We would like to increase that dollar amount and also reach more families in this region.

Each donor has been contributing roughly \$100-200 monthly, or larger amounts every few months..... whatever is comfortable for the donor! Donations are sent to Holy Trinity Armenian Church via check OR Venmo'd to Ani Javardian.

The next step is for each donor to be given a family's contact information, if they wish, to keep in touch with and, God willing, visit one day in Armenia. Hopefully photos and letters can be exchanged between parishioners and the families in Armenia.

A Reflection by Deacon Albert Keshgegian

"I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father." (John 15:15)

In this season of Lent, Holy Week, and Easter, we often reflect upon its major themes, with which we are all familiar: God loved us so much that his Son Jesus Christ came down from heaven and became human, to save us from our sins. He taught and preached and healed. He suffered, died for us on the Cross, and rose again on the third day, promising us all the hope of eternal life with him and the Father. We reflect on the gratitude we feel toward Christ for all he did and all he continues to do for us.

But there's another way of thinking about our relationship with Jesus, one that may affect us on an even deeper emotional level, a relationship that is reflected in the verse from the Gospel of John above (as Jesus spoke with the disciples on the night before he was to be crucified) and depicted in an 8th Century Coptic Church icon of St. Minas and Jesus.

St. Minas is a 3rd century saint who is commemorated in numerous Christian traditions, including the Armenian Church. The details we have about his life are very conflicting, as might be expected about someone who lived so long ago. But we do know that he gave his life for Christ. And we know that he is quite venerated in our Church; there are numerous Armenian churches in different parts of the world that are dedicated to him, and in the past the name Minas has been a popular one for Armenian boys.

The icon depicts St. Minas on the left and Jesus on the right, standing next to each other, looking at us. Jesus is holding an ornately-decorated Gospel book, containing his Word. You see the ears of St. Minas (but not those of Jesus), perhaps reflecting St. Minas listening to the Word. What is remarkable about the icon is that Jesus has his right arm around the shoulders of St. Minas, in a gesture of friendship. You can almost envision Jesus embracing the saint in joy

and friendship in heaven after his martyrdom, perhaps presenting him to God the Father, asking him, as well, to welcome the saint into the warmth and splendor of God's kingdom.

This relationship with Jesus wasn't just for St. Minas or the disciples, and it isn't just for saints in general. Jesus wants to be a friend with each of us. He wants us to relate to him, not only as a deity to be worshipped, but as our close friend, who offers us caring, compassion, guidance, and strength. He wants us to pray to him, not as a superior being to whom we owe a serious obligation, but as someone with whom we can feel free to have a heartfelt conversation about anything and everything.

When we do, when we relate to him in prayer as our friend and listen to what he says, we become his friend. We become one of his own. And he may just greet us someday in heaven by putting his arm around our shoulders and welcoming us in!

And that's the promise of Easter!

Exploring God's Love for Us

On Thursday, January 14, Holy Trinity's Adult Christian Education (ACE) team presented a Zoom program on "Exploring God's Love for Us Through Holy Scripture and the Theology of the Armenian Church." Rev. Fr. Stepanos Doudoukjian, Pastor of St. Peter Armenian Church in Watervliet, NY, and longtime priest in the Eastern Diocese, served as the guest presenter and moderator of the program. Over 25 people attended the program spanning from various parishes across the Eastern Diocese. Fr. Stepanos analyzed the various ways God loves each and every one of us, citing specific references from the Bible and also from our Armenian Church Fathers, including St. Gregory of Narek. The presentation greatly impacted those present as it opened up hearts and minds to the prospect of what God's love truly means for each and every one of us, especially during the dark days of the current COVID-19 pandemic that's dominated our lives for the past year. Participants truly realized even in these tough times, God's love never fails us (1 Corinthians 13:8).

PSALMS HERE, THERE AND EVERYWHERE

Twenty-one parishioners and parish friends gathered together on January 21 for a Zoom session on the psalms in the Badarak, presented by Dn. Albert Keshgegian. He explained that psalms are present throughout the Divine Liturgy – "here, there, and everywhere" in the title of the presentation – and add to the beauty and meaningfulness of the service. The group read the psalms as they were chanted in English by Dn. Armen and Emily Terjimanian. The participants discussed the messages in the psalms, felt the inspiration they provide, and learned how each psalm relates to the point in the Badarak where it occurs. The evening ended with an educational and entertaining quiz on the psalm before the Gospel reading, matching each psalm verse with its specific Holy Day.

NEW- A BOOK CLUB AT HOLY TRINITY!

ACE members, Lucy Aghazarian and Nancy Basmajian have joined forces with Janet Jordan, Acting Sunday School Superintendent, to organize a "club" at Holy Trinity. The focus of the club is what brought the three women together—they love books!

The Holy Trinity Book Club held its inaugural meeting via Zoom on January 28 to talk about an American classic, "To Kill a Mockingbird" by Harper Lee. More than 20 participants joined pastor, Fr. Hakob Gevorgyan and facilitator Nancy Basmajian to discuss the heart-wrenching coming-of-age tale of a small Alabama town in the late 1930's dealing with the sin of racism. The hour-long conversation dealt with family, community, racial justice and the nature of morality. Joining the group was the Rev. Fr. Yeprem Kelegian, retired pastor of St. Mesrob Church in Racine, WI and member of the FAR Board of Directors. Fr. Yeprem offered the closing prayer which eloquently included the characters of the much-beloved novel.

In the past, several ACE programs have focused on books, such as the 2015 "Book and Brunch" group which spent four weeks on "The Sunflower: On the Possibilities and Limits of Forgiveness." Participants followed each discussion with a fellowship brunch at various local eateries. Other book selections included "The Lamentations of Narek," "Recovering Armenia: Belonging in Post Genocide Turkey" (Lerna Ekmekcioglu) and most recently Srpuhi Dussap's "Mayda: Echoes of Protest" led Lucy Aghazarian.

The next meeting of the Holy Trinity Book Club will be held via Zoom on April 8 and will be facilitated by Janet Jordan. The selection is "The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society" by Mary Ann Shaffer and Annie Barrows, a charming book full of eccentric characters and kindly humor.

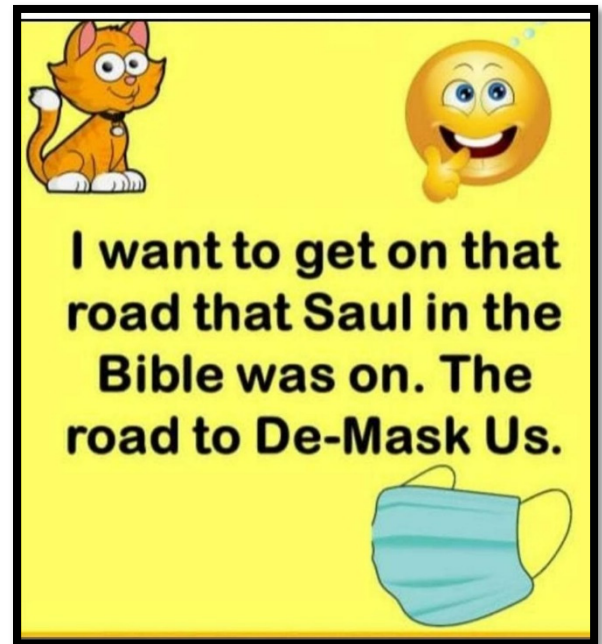

Being able to watch and participate in Badarak from the safety and comfort of our homes has been a blessing. 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SMC HOSTS AN ONLINE LECTURE ON VOCAL HEALTH

On Wednesday, December 16th, the Sacred Music Council hosted a very informative lecture by Dr. Norman Dertad Hogikyan about "Vocal Health and the Pandemic". We learned about the physiology and anatomy of our vocal cords and how the use of our singing voice impacts the potential spread of the coronavirus. It was rather validating and encouraging for many of us, specifically with regard to the choices we are making within our choirs in terms of precautions we are taking to keep us all as safe as possible while also worshiping in the way we know best- through singing or playing our beautiful sacred music.

In the discussion after the lecture, I got to thinking about our vocal health and the impact that stress has on it. For me personally, as a music therapist and a vocalist, I think often about the mind-body connection and how stress impacts that connection often for the worse. In the lecture, the correlation of the impact good health has on good vocal performance was alluded to, and my take away from it is the reminder that we must keep ourselves in good and calm mental and physical health in order to use our God-given voices with the best opportunity for success in singing.

Dr. Hogikyan was able to shine light on several studies that have taken place over the past months regarding singers' masks and what practices have been proven to be more beneficial when attempting to keep the virus from spreading within choirs, including keeping space in mind with a minimum of 12 feet between singers and allowing time for the air in the space to circulate and cleanse periodically when possible. These studies have come out of Colorado State University and are rather fascinating. Dr. Hogikyan also taught us that there is still so much that we don't know about how the voice impacts the spread of the coronavirus, however what we can do is set ourselves up for success by following proper safety measures including wearing suitable masks that fit our faces properly, washing our hands, and remaining at least 12 feet apart when singing, and if possible singing without an organ can be useful as well because the need to project more would lessen.

What Dr. Hogikyan did not say was that he had all the answers of how we should conduct our services. Understanding that each of our parishes have a slightly different space, we were encouraged to be mindful of where we stand in relation to our congregations and to each other, and consider the possibility of singing at home throughout the week to keep our vocal cords strong and able. This seemed to be a key point for many of our participants in the lecture as there was concern that if we are not allowed to sing in church, will we lose our vocal strength? The answer to this, Dr. Hogikyan alluded to, was no- not if we sing at home.

Again, in speaking as a music therapist, there is so much truth to this idea of singing for the sake of giving ourselves joy and song. This practice can be rather restorative and like exercise, good for our overall mental and physical health. So, in closing, I think that I received a wonderful and validating reminder from Dr. Hogikyan which is -TO JUST SING even if you are home by yourself! JUST SING!




We admired beautiful mosaics that adorned this church representing gifts from various countries around the world. Much to our dismay, there was no mosaic representing Armenia. We were saddened, but vowed to do something about it!

We are beyond thrilled to announce that through the generous and tireless resolve of this group of pilgrims, there is now a beautiful mosaic at the Church of the Annunciation representing Armenia.

On February 15, 2021, His Beatitude Archbishop Nourhan Manougian, the Armenian Patriarch of Jerusalem, blessed the Armenian Ceramic Icon which was installed on the wall of the Church of Annunciation in Nazareth. His Beatitude was accompanied by the tile artist of the icon, Mr. Viken Lepejian, and Rev. Fr. Koryoun Baghdasaryan, the Chancellor of the Patriarchate.

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LOCAL SUPPORT FOR ARMENIA & ARTSAKH FAMILIES CONTINUES

In addition to the \$162,500 that we have previously raised and donated to support Artsakh and Armenia, as reported in the last issue, we would like to recognize two new sources of financial assistance. The first is a donation from Dr. & Mrs. Garo Garibian (see below); and the other is a new ongoing project spearheaded by Ani Javardian to benefit families in the Aragatz region. The current status and future of Artsakh & Armenia remain in a state of limbo, but the lives they enjoyed before the war will not return for many years to come, as Azerbaijan, with Turkey's urging, continues with their desire to fully occupy our centuries-old lands of Artsakh and even Armenia. We salute Dn. Garo and Cece for their ongoing support of our homeland which they are continuing to provide, and hope it will provide an impetus for others to follow their humanitarian example to the extent that each one is able.

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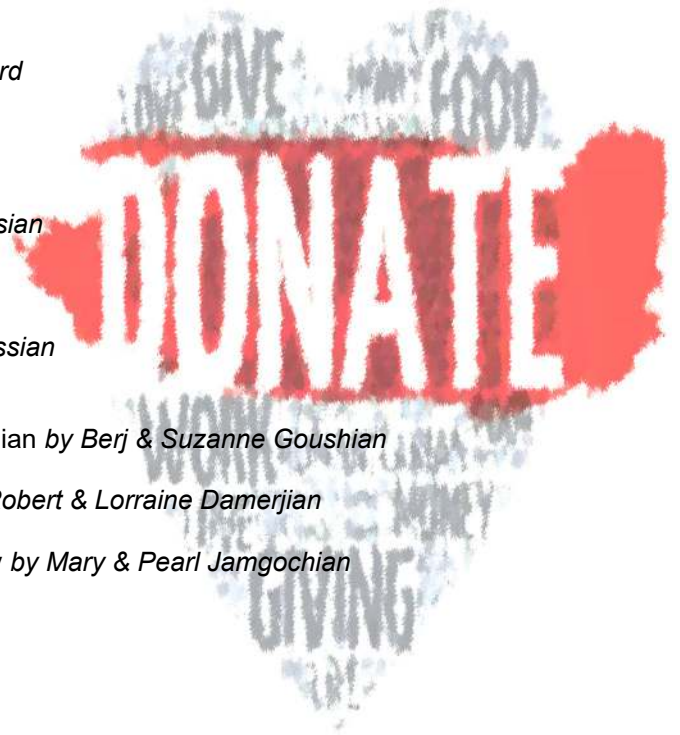
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
