

Garo is a servant of God, obviously, and that commitment and spirituality transcends into his professional life. Thank you, Garo.

Thank you too to Der Hayr who came and visited with my Mom. I asked if they were there for last rites...they didn't find it as funny as I did. So, I am okay now and as I said, I am so glad to be back on Council and feel like I am helping this Church, our Church.

Supporting Armenia

Dear Parishioners,

A team of donors from the East Coast, many of whom are our fellow parishioners, have been taking part in a donation project to help families in the Aragatz region of Armenia who have been negatively affected by the Artsakh war in some way. Many families have lost their loved ones in battle or are facing permanent injuries, leading to a lack of income and support. Prior to the war, many families were already living in poor and uncomfortable conditions without of access to heat, clean water, food, medicine, etc. These families need our help, and such a small amount can make a large difference.

I personally send the money via Zelle to Bishop Mkrtich Proshyan, the Bishop of the Aragatz region in Armenia. Bishop Proshyan personally delivers the funds to 30 families in the region. We have been sending \$1,200 each month for 15 months, which means each family is receiving \$40 a month. We would like to increase that dollar amount and reach the lives of more families in this region!!

So far, we have sent a total of \$18,000 to families in need!!!! However, we are not stopping there...

Each donor has been contributing roughly \$100-200 monthly, or larger amount every few months; whatever is comfortable for the donor! **One-time donations are also greatly appreciated!** *Donations are sent to Holy Trinity Armenian Church via check or Venmo'd to Ani Javardian.*

THE BIBLE IN THE ARMENIAN CHURCH

The following is the last installment of our four-part adult education series on the Bible in the Armenian Church, written by Rev. Fr. Vazken Movsesian of the Western Diocese.

Today, we have a finished copy of the Bible, all nicely printed and available virtually anywhere. What is the role and use of the Bible for us, as members of the Armenian Church? Where does the Bible fit-in in the life of the Armenian Church and the Armenian Christian?

Our Armenian Church is often criticized for not stressing the Bible, or for not emphasizing the Bible enough. When we hear these complaints, we must always keep in mind that the Bible is the product of the Church! Beyond a doubt, our Armenian Church is one of the most biblical churches. Every part of our liturgies, hymns, and services can be paralleled with the Bible. However, the Bible is not the only article of faith our Church has to offer; we have Holy Tradition. These are practices of the Church which were established before the Bible was written. As St. John writes in his Gospel, "Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of the disciples, which are not written in this book: but these are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing you may have life in his name" (John 20:30-31).

Moreover, St. Paul writes, "So then, brethren, stand firm and hold to the traditions which you were taught by us, either by word of mouth or by letter" (2 Thessalonians 2:15). It is apparent that there was an oral tradition which was equally as valid as the written one. Where do we learn about these traditions and about Holy Tradition? In the same place where we learn about the Bible – in the Church!

If we open the Armenian Church lectionary for the Feast of the Holy Translators, we find the Gospel reading is from Matthew 7:6, "Do not give dogs what is holy, do not throw your pearls beforPe swine; they will only trample on them and turn and tear you to pieces."

Perhaps our forefathers had a reason for instructing us with this passage, and I suspect, a very good reason. When we speak of the Bible in the Armenian Church, we speak of the *Breath of God*. The early Church Fathers did not intend the Bible – the Breath of God – to be an evangelical or inspirational tool *outside* the Church. The accessibility of a Bible to us is a phenomenon of only the past few centuries, from the time of the printing press. Even today, in our churches, the Bible, especially the Gospels, is considered sacred. Be it Deacon or Priest, whoever handles the Gospel in the Church, never directly touches the Holy Book, but uses a cloth to hold it.

Because the Church produced the Bible, the Church, ultimately, is the entity which gives authority to the Bible. And, in the same light, only *in the* Church can the Bible be interpreted with authority.



The Bible is not something which God gave directly to us. No, it evolved through time. God gave us the very best – His Son Jesus Christ. The Bible is a collection of the writings and oral traditions of year upon year, century upon century. We as the living Armenian Church today should never forget that in terms of historical reality our Church, along with its rich Tradition existed long before the Bible was compiled. This statement *does not* diminish the importance of the Bible in the Church, only clarifies its place within Tradition.

Yes, the Armenian Church does believe the Holy Scriptures are inspired by God. We even make note of this every Sunday when in the Creed we recite, "We believe also in the Holy Spirit, . . . who spoke in the law and in the prophets and in the Gospels." However, we must keep it in perspective and view it in accordance with and in acknowledgment of the Holy Tradition of the Church.

The Bible is a part of the Holy Tradition of the Church. Although the Bible holds supremacy in this Holy Tradition, we must remember that if we are to speak about the Bible, we must also speak about liturgical and sacramental life, the ecumenical councils, the writings of the Church Fathers, the lives of the saints, canon law, music, and architecture. All of these are sources of faith and very much a part of Holy Tradition. As the living Armenian Church today, we must not only share in the Bible, but in the *entirety* of Holy Tradition.

THE FEAST OF ST. LEVONTIUS

Every year on the Tuesday before the Feast of Vartanantz, clergy gather at St. Leon Armenian Church in Fair Lawn, NJ to celebrate Badarak on the occasion of The Feast of St. Levontius, which honors the sacrifices made by a group of martyred priests, known collectively as the Ghevontian Fathers, led by their heroic leader, St. Levontius. As in past years, Der Hakob continues to be an active participant and/or celebrant at the service.

St. Levontius is acknowledged as an illustrious and radiant figure of the first half of the 5th century, the Golden Age of Literature. He was a commonplace priest in the village of Ichevan, highly educated having studied under St. Mesrob Mashdots and St. Sahag. St. Levontius possessed a brilliant mind, was fluent in Persian and worked as a translator. His strong religious faith and fierce nationalism qualified him as one of those select leaders who participated in the Council of Shahapivan (444 A.D.), a political-religious body which developed rules for their society.

The historic meeting in Artashat in 450 A.D., however, marked St. Levontius' life as a revolutionary. He expressed his intolerance of the presence in Armenia of hundreds of Persian magi who were forcing their pagan religion (Zoroastrianism)

upon the Armenians. He roused the other includina delegates, Vartan Mamigonian, and influenced them to resist the Persians and defend their Christian faith. When the magi tried to break down the doors of the Armenian church, St. Levontius raised a great cry, creating panic among the Persians, while the people, armed with sticks and stones and clubs, drove the enemy back. This stunned the enemy temporarily until they launched another attack.

In 451 A.D., the Persian Army descended upon Armenia again and the very lopsided battle (300,000 Persians versus 66,000 Armenians) took place on the field of Avarayr. St. Vartan Mamigonian led the forces, but it was St. Levontius and other priests who fought along with the soldiers, on the front lines, firing the soldiers' zeal and courage as they struggled to defend their faith.

Many lives were lost in this famous battle. Hundreds were sentenced to die on the spot. Following the initial Vartanantz battle in 451 A.D, the Levontian Fathers were abducted by the Persian and imprisoned. king Eventually, they were brutally tortured killed. Although the and kina commanded their bodies not to be handed over to their families so that their remains become relics, a Christian named Khouzik succeeded in placing each of the bodies in a separate coffin.

The heroism of these martyred priests is remembered every year in the Armenian Church.

On Sunday, February 6, the Holy Trinity Parish of Cheltenham, PA, had the great privilege of celebrating the 100th birthday of Marty Gutchigian, a life-long member of this parish and the first and only one to reach centenarian status. With over one hundred people in attendance, the party was lavishly co-hosted by both his family and the parish, making it a true family event – his birth family and his church family!

Pastor Rev.Fr. Hakob Gevorgyan shared an abbreviated bio of his long and varied background which included Marty's time in the US Navy, beginning in 1942, as he served on the USS Tuscaloosa during World War II. Having been wounded twice, he was awarded a Purple Heart and the Victory Medal.

He is the father of seven children, all of whom were present to celebrate this rare kind of event.

To see and be around Marty, one would be surprised



that they were seeing and talking with one who is 100 years old. His mind is sharp and active with current events, he still enjoys playing water volleyball and spending time near the ocean. He has an open and outgoing personality, and with his comedic nature, is always looking to help people laugh. One of his favorite pastimes is singing, and he didn't disappoint when he took the mike and sang one of his favorite songs – "You'll Never Walk Alone" – to a waiting audience, which ended with affirmative applause.

Marty – and all the guests - were also treated to musical performances by two young adult members of the parish. Sendi Vartanovi, who will soon be completing her undergraduate degree with a Bachelor of Arts in Music Performance, played two poignant Komitas pieces on the violin - Groong and Choghere - to the delight of all.

Following her, Stephan Sarkissian, a high school senior, performed amazingly and as professionally as someone more than twice his age and experience. His offerings included

Oror by Barsegh Kanachyan (which he arranged); Waltz Op.64 No. 2 by Frederic Chopin; and Piano Sonata No.14 Op.27 Nr.2 by Ludwig Van Beethoven. Stephan will be off to college in the fall, pursuing a career in music.

It was a day for all to remember: to celebrate a 100-year-event; to be inspired by the upbeat and positive outlook of Marty, even at this age; and to enjoy the shared fellowship which connects all of us through our heritage and our church.

2022 Lenten Series - LOVE WAS AT THE CENTER

It was March and the cold winter days lingered endlessly. But an occasional whiff of sweet air came our way signaling Spring would come soon and the holiest weeks on the Christian calendar would follow. Fr. Hakob Gevorgyan and his ACE committee were ready with a 6-week series of programs to mark Lenten season via the ZOOM platform.

Week One: An interactive Rest Service led by Fr. Hakob took place, featuring the voices of our Church School educators and students reciting the penitential prayers of St. Nerses Shnorhali asking God for forgiveness.

Week Two: "Love Thy Neighbor" was a two-part program. It began with a video discussion led by the Rev. Fr. Yeprem Kelegian of Wisconsin joined by three other distinguished clergy who discussed the need of our churches to be more involved in social justice efforts, particularly those concerning racism. All four seemed to appeal to our "better angels" urging us to engage with an open and loving heart in activities that would lessen injustice in our community. Using their discussion as a stepping stone, the second part of the evening continued to explore ways, as a faith community, to heed God's core Commandment and breakdown the barriers of not only racism, but anything that prevents us from creating a loving and less divisive world.

The discussion led by Lucy Aghazarian, ACE member, was lively but it was clear that solutions for collective action would not be easy to find in one evening. However, what we could all do immediately and individually was to take the challenge and examine how we personally approach these issues and perhaps make changes to our own behavior and attitude.

Week Three: Leslie Movsesian, a former superintendent of HTAC's Church School, gave her audience a deeply moving account of her recent life-threatening illness and the power of love, compassion and empathy. Leslie used Biblical passages and her artwork to explore God's loving nature and His influence in her faith during her difficult battle and likened her journey to Jesus' suffering in the days leading to His death and resurrection. Through the power of faith, science, and encouragement from her family and community she endured and prevailed. She described how in her darkest moments, she would "hear" the healing voices of those who were praying for her and who demonstrated their compassion in a thousand different ways like soft whispers in her ears keeping her strong and fighting.

Leslie concluded her presentation by sharing two paintings she had produced when her health had improved to further express what she perhaps could not do in words. The first, a young girl sitting by a mountain side, her head lowered, distraught. The second painting was of a woman warrior clad in a metal armor, her wounds still fresh and visible, standing tall, holding her head high, her attention drawn to the distance. Faith and love had won. The despair on one canvas had been replaced by victory on the other.

Week Four: At the conclusion of Badarak parishioners made their way to Santerian Hall and enjoyed a Lenten luncheon (the first one since 2019) to be followed by guest speaker Christopher H. Zakian, Director of Communications for the Eastern Diocese of the Armenian Church of America. His subject was "Vartan, Yeghishe, and the Theater of War."

If some of us expected the usual celebration of the legendary Vartan Mamigonian, military hero, we were proved wrong. Once Mr. Zakian took the podium, we knew this was going to be different. In a soft but dramatic delivery, Mr. Zakian brought to life the fierce battle of Avarayr in 451 A.D. based on the book by Yeghishe Vardapet, historian of the 5th century.

Suddenly the room was hushed, the audience transfixed. We could "hear" and "see" men, horses, arms, metal clashing and soldiers falling on the blood-soaked earth. For the massive Persian army, vastly outnumbering the Armenian soldiers, it was just another battle. For Vartan and his men, it was the survival of their nation, their identity and, above all, their Christian religion. They had made a pact with God and they were staying true to it.

"The soul of a nation and its people," said Mr. Zakian, "is revealed on the battlefield." While the Armenians lost at Avarayr, their courage and faith remained unquestioned, for in the end, they won the right to practice their Christianity freely for generations to come.

The comments at the conclusion of the presentation ranged from "fantastic account" to "the best description we have ever heard of this key battle." Indeed, it was!

Week Five: Senior Deacon, Albert Keshgegian, presented "Songs of Inspiration" by examining the connection of two popular songs to Biblical references. Being well-versed in Biblical works, he provided surprising and thought-provoking questions for discussion prompted by Dolly Parton's "A Coat of Many Colors" and Josh Groban's "You Raise Me Up."

Parton's song had a touching narrative about her mother who had stitched her a coat of many colors from pieces of rags when she was a child. She had told her that the coat would bring her luck. While Parton had suffered the mockery of her classmates, she felt rich and loved because her mother had poured love in every stitch of the coat. A colorful coat was also mentioned in Genesis 37 in the story of Joseph who wore the coat given to him by his father to signify his being a favorite son. Sadly, in that story, the coat had brought Joseph great suffering from his envious siblings, but in God's own timing, it turned good.

Josh Groban's song "You Raise Me Up" does not identify who the "you" is, but it is clearly someone of infinite and miraculous power who could lift him to heavenly heights when he was weary.

Both songs, rendered in contrasting styles, Parton in her up-beat Southern twang and Groban with a soulful voice, were equally inspiring.

The discussion portion of the hour was devoted to the numerous questions raised by these beautiful songs. For example - what is real wealth, what and who makes us feel loved, to whom do we appeal in moments of darkness, and do we feel our Creator's presence when we are alone, in quiet prayer.

Week Six: Very Rev. Fr. Mesrop Parsamyan*, Director of Ministries for the Diocese of the Armenian Church, delighted and inspired us with his topic: "Solitude and Silence as Spiritual Disciplines" a most timely subject for our current world filled with noise and strife. In his presentation, he cited three important elements to build and maintain a healthy spiritual life: 1. A space of one's own. 2. A place uninterrupted by distracting sounds. 3.Discipline.

While it may be difficult to find a physical space, Fr. Mesrop explained, we can create a mental space to isolate ourselves from material concerns. Silence is necessary to be able to communicate with God with an honest, open heart despite distracting thoughts challenging our concentration.

As to discipline, if we can devote numerous hours and energy to keeping physically fit and healthy, we should be able to apply an equal amount of energy and time for our spiritual health. Silence and solitude are necessary to create a sanctuary, to commune with God, to find guidance, consolation and solace in dark times, and gratitude in joyful moments. But it requires vigilance and must become a regular part of our daily life. Fr. Mesrop's "prescription" was a much appreciated and instructive hour, indeed.

As we left our six-week series behind us, we looked forward with enduring faith and hope, to next year and another exciting and enriching series. Much gratitude to all who participated and helped make this year's programs enlightening, informative and uplifting.

*Note: Since the time of Fr. Mesrob's presentation during Lent, he has since been elected to the office of Primate of the Eastern Diocese of The Armenian Church.



The first season of the Holy Trinity Zoom Book Club officially wrapped up on June 2 with a discussion of its 12th book selection, "The Dutch House" by Anne Patchett and facilitated by Suzanne Sherenian.

From January of 2021 through June of this year, the Planning Team of Lucy Aghazarian, Nancy Basmajian and Janet Jordan presented a dynamic and eclectic selection of books and facilitators. Guest discussion leaders from outside the parish included Rev. Fr. Yeprem Kelegian of Wisconsin and



Elise Antreassian of New York; and from within our community, facilitators included our pastoral intern, Dn. Armen Terjimanian, Marge Ayoub, Nancy Hovnanian, Suzanne Sherenian, and Emily Terjimanian.

Most recently, the participants read "The Immoral Life of Henrietta Lacks" by Rebecca Skloot and "Mayrig" by Henri Verneuil (Ashod Malakian).

In March, Marge Ayoub capably led a discussion on the short life of Henrietta Lacks, a poor Southern tobacco farmer whose cancer cells (taken without her knowledge) became one of the most important tools in medicine. The conversation was enriched by the participation of our own "scientist in residence," Dr. Albert Keshgegian who patiently explained some of the more complicated elements of the book.

In April, Elise Antreassian who is well-known in our community as a workshop and retreat leader, guided readers through a memoir by renowned French-Armenian filmmaker Henri Verneuil. His moving story of a boy and his family recounts the quintessential immigrant experience tinged with the hues of Armenian joy and sorrow. Judging from the shared stories of the participants, the group clearly empathized with Verneuil's story. Ms Antreassian's comments and observations were especially instructive given that she was the French-into-English translator of the book!
