This mission is realized through worship, education, witness, service, and a common life in Christ as expressed in the distinctive faithexperience of the Armenian people. All the faithful of the Armenian Church – both clergy and laity – are called to participate fully in this mission.

Balancing our Physical and Spiritual Life

"So God created humankind in His image, in the image of God He created them; male and female He created them. God blessed them, and God said to them, 'Be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth and subdue it; and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves upon the earth'" (Genesis 1: 27-28).

Some people still think that human life is a result of evolution. But this passage very clearly tells us that our physical life is created by our Heavenly Father. We are God's creation, we are His children and a part of His plan. God loved mankind so much that He sacrificed His Only Son for our salvation.

Physical life is important because it's a gift from God. So we have to value ours and others' lives, and do our best to serve God and to please Him in our daily life.

Physical life is like a visitation to an unknown world where we grow up, get education, form families, make friends and try to enjoy all the beauty that God created for us.

We should remember that our physical life is temporary, and we are guests in this world.

Can guests make a difference in this world? The answer is yes. We can't solve all the problems of this world but each one of us can do his/her best to make this world a better place as it was from the beginning of creation.

We shouldn't concentrate only on our physical life. Because we are also spiritual beings, we have body and soul. In the Bible we read the following, "My soul, wait in silence for God only, for my hope is from Him" (Psalm 62:5). "For He has satisfied the thirsty soul, and the hungry soul He has filled with what is good" (Psalm 107:9). It is obvious that we have a soul and our soul hopes for a better future. And God is the one who can satisfy the thirst and the hunger of our souls. He is the source of faith, hope and love.

Dear faithful.

Most of the people take good care of their physical life which is good and normal. But hopefully, with the same enthusiasm, we can take care of our souls. Our souls are going to live forever but they need nourishment now. How can we nourish our souls?

We can nourish our souls with God's word and prayer, which means to read the Bible on a daily basis and speak with God from the depths of the heart (St. Gregory of Narek). And, of course, we need the gifts of the Holy Spirit, which are wisdom, understanding, counsel, knowledge, fortitude, piety and fear of the Lord (Isaiah 11:2-3). May God always bless us with physical and spiritual health. Amen

A Reflection by Deacon Albert Keshgegian:

They were two little girls, about 5 years old, born on almost the same day, classmates in school, one white and one black, best friends who thought of themselves as twins. They played together, giggled together, and often even dressed in matching outfits. One day an older kid said to them, "You can't be twins! Your skins are a different color." One of the girls answered back, "You're wrong! We're twins because we share the same soul".

--True story on CBS Mornings TV show

I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another. (John 13:34-35)

Those two little girls were full of love, as children often are. They looked past their obvious outward physical differences and saw that they were totally alike in something much more important, something deeper and within themselves, their "souls". And in a follow up story on the same network several years later, the two girls, now older, still felt the same way. But for even older kids, and especially for adults, "reality" sets in, as one of the girls' mothers commented on the TV program. The child's natural tendency to love is often replaced by the grownup's tendency first to distrust and then to dislike or even to be mean or show hatred.

And in recent years it has gotten even worse. People don't want immigrants, forgetting that their own families were themselves immigrants some years earlier. People dislike and look down upon someone whose skin is of a different color or who has a different sexual orientation or gender identity. Differing political opinions are expressed in a mean-spirited way reflecting anger toward, and hatred of, the other person or group.

That's not what Jesus taught us to do. He wants us to be better than that. Jesus commanded that we love one another. Just as Jesus showed his supreme love for each of us, by living his life, and giving up his life, for us, we should in turn love others. That doesn't mean we have to always agree with them, go to a football game or shopping with them, approve of the way they dress or style their hair or whom they love, or invite them to our home for dinner. It does mean that we treat everyone with kindness and respect, without anger or disdain. It does mean that we should want the best for them.



God created the world and every single human being out of love. He loves each of us equally. And he wants us, as much as possible, to become like him. As Jesus summed it up in the Sermon on the Mount, "Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly father is perfect" (Matthew 5:48).

That's a tall order! After all, we are only human and we will fail. But, as Christians, we have been given the gift of confessing our sins and being forgiven, no matter how many times it takes. To me the total love that Christ showed and commanded us to practice is the most inspiring part of being his follower. It's a goal that I strive for every day. After all, shouldn't every Christian?

Diocesan Assembly Report

The annual Diocesan Assembly was held in-person from May 4 -6, 2023, hosted by St. Sarkis Parish, Dallas, Texas. Below are some of the highlights.

This was my first in-person assembly, so I was a "newbie" - Der Hakob was my guide through the basics. Elections for various offices and committees were held. These elections all require a "roll call" of every eligible voter (@ 135 of us). It took five ballots to get all these positions filled. Holy Trinity is also represented with the election of Dn. Garo Garibian to the Diocesan Council.

Finally, they have started renovations on St. Vartan Cathedral, broken out into four phases with the first one being the roof and dome starting in June of this year. The timeline for completion is through 2026, with an estimated cost of \$25 million. The fundraising has already begun.

Friday's Assembly was set up as round-table discussions most of the day. Hayr Mesrop Parsamyan, Primate, introduced his Diocesan plan: Growing in Faith Together, GIFT. We were all asked questions on the various topics in his plan: Worship, Education, Witness, Service, and Common Life and each table was asked to submit our comments online.

There were video presentations on FAR, St Vartan Camp renovations, Hye Camp, ACYOA, St Nersess Seminary (who, by the way, is in dire need of seminarians for our Eastern

Diocese; they only have two seminarians ready to graduate and no one coming up) and a video presentation by our own Emily Terjimanian on Racial and Social Justice and Repair.





Friday Night was the banquet in the Hall at St. Sarkis honoring the 2023 Armenians of the Year: Mr. & Mrs. Elie and Ela Akilian (the main benefactors in building the church);

> Mr. David Hotson (the architect of the new church). Before the banquet, a prayer was offered in the new church.

The church is beautiful on the inside, but the exterior is what is stunning. The architect modeled the exterior after St Hripsime Church in Etchmiadzin. The façade of the church has tiny little snowflake, stars, circles (no two are alike) representing the 1.5 million Armenians who perished in the Genocide - truly amazing.

Saturday morning held a final brief session, followed by adjournment of the Diocesan Assembly.

We were so happy to see each other in person that the ladies did not need an ice breaker exercise.

The Thursday morning session was a formal business meeting. Reports were presented and discussed. The included CASP, the Old Age home in Armenia, and Saintly Women's Day. This was followed with a "Sharing Is Caring" Workshop where we discussed our successes, voiced concerns, asked questions and got to know each other better.

The idea I liked the best was the cooking classes utilizing Zoom. Many ladies have asked us for a cooking activity but are too busy to come to church on a Saturday or stay later on a Sunday. One of the Guilds presents cooking sessions on Zoom and it has become very successful. It's certainly something for us to consider. Another Guild remembers deceased members periodically. We should consider honoring our ladies who are not with us.

The highlight of the day was visiting the new St. Sarkis Church and Community Center. The building was inspired by St. Hripsime Church in Etchmiadzin. The facade is composed of 1.5 million unique pixels representing the Armenians who

perished in the Genocide. The interior is so different than our beautiful Holy Trinity. It is stark white with no stainedglass windows. The beauty is in the simplicity.

We were all impressed with the Community Center with a hall that resembled a ballroom. The building houses classrooms, a bridal suite for weddings and an adjacent gymnasium. It was the kitchen that blew us out of the water. You name the appliance or fixture and the kitchen had it. We could not stop taking pictures to share when we returned to our home parishes.

The highlight on Friday was meeting our new Primate, Very Rev Fr. Mesrob Parsamyan. We attended the Diocesan Meeting where he spoke. To our pleasant surprise, he followed us back to our meeting where he chatted with the ladies & answered our questions. It was a memorable meeting.

The afternoon session was quite fruitful with a workshop titled Growing Together in Faith, led by Salpi Katanjian, a member of the host church. She encouraged us to think about our priorities - Christian sisterhood - and reflect, prepare & improve. We were so moved by the experience that we gave her a standing ovation.

The closing activity for the 34th Assembly was the Women of Wonder Brunch on Saturday. We recognized & honored 3 ladies from the host parish. for their many years of dedication & service to the church and the Women's Guild. The Primate attended and presented awards to the recipients and addressed the gathering.

We look forward to meeting next year in Springfield, Massachusetts. It will be my last Assembly as a member of the Executive Board of the Diocesan Women's Guild. It has been an honor to represent our beloved Holy Trinity.

The second edition in 1998 also sold out. A journey "day by day" through Lent, the journal featured meditations based on the biblical reading for each day and relating to life today, simple, heart-felt prayers,

anecdotal information on Scripture and the Armenian Church, and reflection questions.

We are happy to report that the Journal has continued to inspire the faithful especially during the Lenten season, a quarter of a century later. Selections from it are being used for the Lenten discussion program at Martyrs Church on Long Island and

"I have a copy of a Lenten Journal that belonged to my late mother. We read this journal every year during Lent just as she had; it's very cherished and a lovely book we truly appreciate. This journal has such a tremendous impact on me during this Lenten season, both in faith and in the journey of Lent, following in the tradition of my late mother. The work is truly a blessing and relates so much to our walk in life, to be more like Christ. I look forward to it every year as part of the Lenten season. I'm wondering if it is possible to get another copy of it?"

Although long out of print, fortunately it is again possible to obtain more copies of My Lenten Journal, as the church has been able to get a new limited run printed. Two copies were sent to North Carolina, and the book is again available through our Holy Trinity bookstore.

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ACYOA Juniors Hye M'rtsoon Sports Weekend

The Armenian Church Youth Organization of America (ACYOA) Junior members recently had a fantastic get-together in Boston, hosted by St. James Armenian Church in Watertown, MA. Maria Derderian, the Youth Minister for St. James, coordinated the event with the support of St. James clergy, Father Arakel and Yn. Natasha Aljalian.

The gathering took place from May 26th to 29th, 2023, and brought together 130 juniors from 11 different chapters spanning New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Connecticut, and Massachusetts. The theme of the event was "AIM HYE," promoting unity and connection among Armenian youth.

To facilitate transportation, Holy Trinity shared a bus with St. Sahag & St. Mesrob Armenian Apostolic Church. 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Church School - Armenian Language School Update

Armenian Language classes for Spring 2023 semester started right after Christmas celebration at Church, with our Church students.







During Spring semester, our students continued learning Armenian Alphabet letters and Armenian Alphabet song (with beginners), and reading Armenian famous writers' poems and stories, and Armenian magic songs (with older students). We also welcomed four new students in our class this Spring semester (*Aren*, *Lily*, *Eduard*, and *Robert*).

Our activities developed in three directions: 1) learning and writing Armenian Alphabet Letters, 2) learning Armenian group songs, 3) preparing individual assignments based on previous background and knowledge of Armenian language.

For example, learning of Armenian Alphabet included Gevorg Emin's "Mer Aybubene" (Our Alphabet) reading all 39 lines dedicated to all 39 letters in Armenian Alphabet.

Group songs included learning and singing of i) "Mer Hayrenik" (Our Motherland) Armenian anthem written by Barsegh Kanachyan and Mikael Nalbandayn; ii) "Piti Aprenk" (We Must Live) touching song written by Edgar Gyanjumyan and Seda Gyanjumyan for children of Artsakh. In fact, the composer, maestro Ganjumyan felt very happy knowing that children of our Church would sing this song at our Concert, and asked Stephan to pass his best wishes and all the the best to all our children; iii) "Khajeri Erg" (Song of Braves, or Song of Leblejee people) from Karine operetta written by Tigran Chukhajyan, Takvor Nalyan.

Our students (*Karine, Sona, Elena, Mari, Grace, Lenna, Vardan, Suren, Garik*) learned also individual assigned poems and songs, including "**Azatutyun**" (Freedom) by Mikael Nalbandyan, **Sardarapat** by Alexander Hovhannisyan, "**Khosk im Vordun**" by Silva Kaputikyan, "**Erevani Gishernere Kaputak**" by Aleksander Dolukhanyan and Ashot Grashi, "**Eraz**" (Dream) by Shahaziz and Vardapet Komitas, "**Im Yerevan**" by Arno Babadjanyan and Vahan Harutyunyan, "**Hey Jan, Yerevan**" by Artemni Ayvazyan and Hovhannes Ghukasyan, "**Tsitsernaki bune**" by Ghazaros Aghayan and Barsegh Kanachyan, "Erebuni-Yerevan" by Edgar Hovhannisyan, "**Ampi Takits Jur e Galis**" (from Anush opera) by Hovhannes Tumanyan and Armen Tigranyan, and "Yerevan" by Robert Amirkhanyan. Thanks to our assistant teacher helping also with piano, Stephan, most of those songs have a piano accompany, helping with quick memorizing.

Students of Armenian Language Class, were very excited after they successfully performed a Winter Concert in December 2022, dedicated to Vardapet Komitas, and now, our talented students (also *Anna* and *Alex*) are preparing their next **Concert** for June 4, dedicated to "**Armenia – Artsakh – Spyurk** - **Friends of Armenia**"!

Investment Committee Report Recap of Church Investments and Endowments December 31, 2022

(Inadvertently left out of Annual Parish Assembly Booklet)

In 2022 an overdue stock market correction occurred caused by the threat of a slowing economy, rising interest rates and high inflation. Our church investment portfolio was not immune to the downturn as we incurred a 10.5% loss of \$181 261. While our actual results are disappointing, we are pleased our portfolio performed substantially better than the benchmarks as shown below:

In May 2022 Michael Tookmanian and Stephen Ajemian announced to Der Hayr our intention to retire from the church committee effective December 31, 2022. Mike and Steve have served on the Investment Committee since the 1970s and 1980s respectively.

Some of our committee's recent accomplishments that we are very proud of are:

- 1) From 2011 to the present our church portfolio has grown from \$827,000 to \$1,539 793. During this period a net profit of \$768,000 has been generated for the church and as requested \$81,000 has been returned to Parish Council. It is important to note that since 2008 our current balance has been reached without any contribution of funds from Parish Council.
- 2) From 2011 through 2021 our committee substantially outperformed the Armenian Church Endowment Fund (ACEF) in eight of the eleven years by a margin of 16%. Our



equity exposure ranged from 35% to 65% or an average of 50% compared to ACEF's 90% exposure to equities. With only one down year in the stock market in the period mentioned, the ACEF should have outperformed Holy Trinity in most if not all years.

3) We developed a Plan and Policy Statement to follow for current and future Church Investment Committees. The Plan, which was approved by Parish Council, keeps the best interests of our church and parishioners in mind when selecting securities for investment with a strong consideration for minimal risk.

We wish our committee continued success going forward and it has been our high honor to have served all the past and present members of our beloved church.

- 1. It was only February but nature was rushing towards Spring—daffodils, crocuses and snowdrops were poking their head out of the cold earth and ACE (Adult Christian Education), celebrating its 10th year led by Nancy Basmajian, was readying its programming. On the first day of Lent, February 24th, 12 married couples from our parish virtually joined Fr. Hakob and Yn. Anna to recite the beautiful prayers of St. Nersess Shnorhali, a beloved poet, mystic, and priest of the 11th century, and to petition God for forgiveness.
- 2. On a wintry Saturday morning, more than 20 volunteer men and women arrived at the modern kitchen of HTAC to prepare what they have been doing since 2005: making meals for the unknown elderly and isolated seniors who are supported by the Caring for Friends organization of Philadelphia. On this day, they prepared 180 individual mouthwatering meatloaf dinners with sides of pilaf and vegetables bringing the total meals prepared over the years to an impressive 6,400.

Spearheaded by the indefatigable Jeanette Der Hagopian, her crew, which included Der Hakob, worked with amazing efficiency—shoulder to shoulder, shaping the mini loaves, cooking, packing, and labeling the individual dinners as chatter and laughter filled the room with fellowship and goodwill. We can say, without boasting, that this Service Day was truly answering God's commandment to Love Thy Neighbor as You would Love Thyself.

- 3. On March 19th, a delicious traditional Mitchink Luncheon prepared by our church ladies marked the midpoint in Lent and was followed by our guest speaker, Christopher Zakian, Director of Communication for the Eastern Diocese. It was his second appearance at HTAC and we looked forward to his presentation. As in his appearance last year, Mr. Zakian reached back to the the very beginning of Armenian church history to recount a fascinating legend which is believed to have been instrumental in transforming a pagan Armenian nation into a Christian one and establishing an apostolic church. It seems a delegation called the Voskians witnessed a miracle as a herd of deer were killed and subsequently returned to life, thus believed to have been resurrected. Deer (maral in Armenian) were considered holy creatures and symbolized life and freedom and have since figured prominently in Armenian art and literature. It was a fascinating story and we look forward to future presentations which shed light on our rich ancient history.
- 4. On Sunday, March 26th, following the Divine Liturgy, ACE presented an inspiring film, "Amish Grace," based on a true story about the 2006 shooting at an Amish schoolhouse killing several children.

After a brief fellowship hour, more than 25 people stayed to view the film which raised multiple difficult questions: How does a Christian community respond to such violence? How does it forgive such senseless acts? What is forgiveness? In the film, the mother of a murdered child cries out, "God has shattered my heart, I will not forgive God!" And yet, in Matthew 18:21-22, when one of Jesus' disciples asks God: How many times should I forgive someone who does something wrong to me? Is seven times enough? Jesus answers: Not just seven times, but seventy-seven times. Ultimately, the mother in question does join her neighbors in extending forgiveness and also welcomes to their community the wife and children of the man who committed the atrocity.

At the conclusion of the film, numerous questions were raised again during the discussion session led by Fr. Hakob who perhaps left us with the most difficult question of all: *Can a Christian heart harbor both hatred and love at the same time?*

5. Weary of an unending diet of bad news confronting us daily, we looked forward to our final Lenten speaker, the Reverend Flora Keshgegian and her subject "Hope in Hard Times." A theologian, Episcopal priest, writer of multiple books, educator, chaplain, and yes, the sister of our very own Sr. Dn. Albert and a child of Holy Trinity in her younger years, Flora Keshgegian was to talk about a hopeful future when so much around us seems bleak. More than 30 participants attended the Zoom presentation, eager to hear what she had to say.

Rev. Keshgegian did not have a quick fix in mind, but she suggested a doable strategy which would make each day of our life the best that it could be and not just one more dreary day to get through. She explained: Imagine your life as a journey and therefore its end, death, as your destination. Consider each day of your metaphorical journey an opportunity for new discovery, possibility, and inspiration. "Don't rush through it," she seemed to be saying. God has created a wondrous universe, savor it, make each moment of the journey your focus rather than its destination. Approach all things with an open heart, faith, curiosity, love and kindness, rather than fear and trepidation. There are infinite possibilities all around us!

But she added one important condition to assure the success of our life adventure: Do not leave without first cleaning your house. Sort things out, declutter, organize, discard the unnecessary, travel light. Be always mindful of what is important and what is unnecessary. While life as a journey metaphor was not new (see end note), it was made more urgent than ever. Thank you Dr. Keshgegian for your invaluable and reassuring message.

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
