The mission of the Armenian Apostolic Orthodox Church is to preach the Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ and to proclaim its message of salvation. This mission is realized through worship, education, witness, service, and a common life in Christ as expressed in the distinctive faithexperience of the Armenian people. All the faithful of the Armenian Church – both clergy and laity – are called to participate fully in this mission.

War, Atrocities, Ethnic-Cleansing

Luke 23:13-34

Dear Faithful,

Our world is in crisis because we see wars, atrocities and ethnic-cleansing in different places of the world.

After the Armenian Genocide which took place in 1915 and we lost more than 1.5 million Armenians, today our people once again are facing ethnic-cleansing. In 2020 our neighbor Azerbaijan attacked Artsakh and this war, with some interruptions, continued until 2023. As a result of this war, we lost more than five thousand young men, more than ten thousand were injured and at the end we lost our Republic of Artsakh. Over one hundred twenty-thousand people were forced to leave their homeland where they were living for a few thousand years. Now our people are saying, "We suffered a lot. Why is this happening to the Armenian people again?"

First of all, let us pay attention to this Bible verse which will help us to better understand our world and its sad reality.

"Pilate, wanting to release Jesus. addressed again; but they kept shouting, 'Crucify, crucify Him!' A third time he said to them, 'Why, what evil has He done?' "(Luke 23:20-22). Jesus Christ who is the Son of God and who is God, came down from heaven to bring us the Good News and to save us but He was arrested, tortured and crucified from His own creation. And from this He brought salvation to mankind. Through the perspective of our eyes and beliefs, we harden our hearts on the outlook of the world, but through God's eyes there is a path and a destination - a good destination - but a hard path.



Secondly, "They crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on His right and one on His left. Then Jesus said, Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing." (Luke 23:33-34). It is very hard to forgive those who hurt us, but Jesus was praying and forgiving those who were killing Him. If we want to be forgiven by God, we have to forgive all those who sin against us.

Finally, when our people were leaving Artsakh, many of them left their homes as is, because they barely escaped from massacres. Some of them burned their homes, but one lady did something different. She cleaned her house, washed the dishes and left the house in perfect condition so that the newcomers will live and enjoy the house.

In conclusion:

God willing, our stolen Artsakh will come back to its real owner, the Armenian nation, because we Christians believe that after Crucifixion there is always Resurrection. Just as this lady cleaned her house, I hope we also can be cleansed ourselves from sin so the Holy Spirit will dwell in us and help us always to make a right choice and please our Lord. Amen

This February 6th the Armenian Church commemorates St. Ghevont the Priest and His Companions.

The following is a reflection by Deacon Albert Keshgegian based upon the epistle reading for the day:

Praise be to the God and father of our lord Jesus Christ! In his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, and into an inheritance that can never perish, spoil or fade – kept in heaven for you, who through faith are shielded by God's power until the coming of the salvation that is ready to be revealed in the last time. In this you greatly rejoice, though now for a little while you may have had to suffer grief in all kinds of trials. These have come so that your faith – of greater worth than gold, which perishes even though refined by fire – may be proved genuine and may result in praise, glory, and honor when Jesus Christ is revealed. Though you have not seen him, you love him; and even though you do not see him now, you believe in him and are filled with an inexpressible and glorious joy, for you are receiving the goal of your faith, the salvation of your souls. 1 Peter 1:3-9

A diamond doesn't become brilliant, hard, and precious until after many years of intense heat and pressure. Gold must be melted at high temperatures to remove impurities before it can be made into beautiful jewelry. Iron must be heated in a blast furnace to remove impurities and form the alloys that make steel strong, tough, and so useful. So it is sometimes with our faith.

Our faith is of greater worth to God than gold, more precious than diamonds, more useful than steel. But sometimes circumstances combine to test our faith. Trials come into our lives, bringing times of adversity. These may lead us to question the promises of God or even his very existence. But just as diamonds, gold, and steel become harder, more beautiful, and more useful by the processes they must go through, so also our faith can become stronger and be proved genuine by going through trials in our lives.

God helps us get through these times of trial by shielding us in his power, helping us to keep our faith, until the day that Christ returns. God gave us his son Jesus and he, through his resurrection, gave us a gift that is perfect. A gift that will never perish, spoil, or fade. A gift that is being kept in heaven for us who have faith – the salvation of our souls and eternal life with God. Our faith assures us of this gift and fills us with inexpressible and glorious joy in anticipation of receiving it, no matter what trials we may be facing in our lives.

St.Ghevont and his companion priests felt this joy, even though their lives were filled with great adversity. This group of clergymen lived at the time of the Battle of Vartanantz. They are named after the priest Levontius (Ghevont Yerets) and also include Catholicos Hovsep, Bishops Sahag and Tatig, Priests Mousheh, Arshen, Manuel, Abraham, and Khoren, and Deacons Kachach and Abraham.

St Ghevont and his companions participated in the Council of Artashat, which wrote the reply to the demands of the Persian king that Armenians adopt paganism. As part of that reply the Vartanians said to the king:



We are ready to serve you; we are ready to put to your disposition all we have; we are even ready to fight for you and to shed our blood for the empire... but when it comes to our eternal salvation, there is nothing you or your priests can do... your religion is a lie and should be laughed at... ours alone is true and teaches the love of God and of men... we cannot worship the sun and the moon and the wind and fire.

Ghevont Yerets was one of the primary leaders against the Persian king. He had led an uprising against the Persian priests who had come to Armenia to convert churches into fire temples. Before the Battle of Avarayr he addressed the soldiers and exhorted them to sacrifice themselves for the sake of God's immortal power, as Jesus had sacrificed himself for us. Ghevont Yerets has been called the soul of the movement of Christian resistance.

St. Ghevont and his companions were martyred in the wilderness (so that their people could not obtain their relics) a few years after the Vartanantz battle, on July 25, 454. They were martyred for their strength of faith and their love for the Armenian nation.

Christian Armenia has continued to face adversity through the centuries. Persians were followed by Arabs, who in turn were followed by Turks and, in our lifetime, Communists and Azerbaijan. Centuries of domination and subjugation, culminating in massacres, genocide, and recently, "ethnic cleansing" in Artsakh. Despite all this, Armenians have clung fast to their Christian faith and have persevered. Their faith has been tested time and time again, but adversity has made it grow only stronger. And through it all, the Armenian nation has continually thanked God for hope of life and an inheritance in heaven, given to us by the resurrection of his Son.

We all have ups and downs in our lives. We all encounter times of trial that are difficult to get through and that test our faith. We need to remember what St. Ghevont and his companion priests knew and what Armenians have felt through the centuries. Facing difficult times is not a reason to give up on our faith. It's an opportunity to allow our faith to grow stronger, to take comfort in the promises God has given us, and to feel the inexpressible inner joy of living as God proposes, not the world.

Nancy has been in ministry for most of her life, having earned a Master of Divinity degree from Eastern Baptist Theological School. Thirty-four years of her career were served at the Eastern Diocese in various capacities. Upon her retirement from there, she committed her time to her home parish, Holy Trinity.

With the full support of Der Hakob, she became the guiding force behind the creation of the Adult Christian Education (ACE) ministry at Holy Trinity, which has just enjoyed their tenth anniversary. Nancy would disagree but we are fortunate to have her as our leader. She inspires us with her knowledge and challenges us with her creativity for us to dig deeper as we study Scripture in our walk of faith. Through and through, she is a daughter of Holy Trinity.

Holy Trinity Commemorates National Grandparents Day

Our faithful gathered on September 10--a rainy Sunday morning—to honor the grandparents of our parish. In his sermon, Fr. Hakob gave a brief history of the origins of National Grandparents Day and its ratification by Congress in the 1970s. It is observed in the U.S. on the Sunday following Labor Day; this year, it was September 10.

Fr. Hakob began an inspiring Blessing Service (written by Elise Antreassian, the former Director of Christian Education for the Diocese) saying, "...we celebrate the precious love grandparents share with their grandchildren and their unique contribution to our community's story." Grandparents were given candles to hold during the service in which Fr. Hakob prayed, "that our grandparents, as they bear candles in church today, always bear the light of Christ to their beloved grandchildren, acting as beacons of hope and right living."

The service, which followed the Divine Liturgy, included other prayers and litanies from the Armenian Church tradition, a reading of Psalm 128 recited by the entire congregation and a final blessing from Fr. Hakob as follows:

"Loving God, bless all our grandparents, those with us here today, those who cannot be with us, and those who have gone to be with you. May they heed your call to share their wisdom and faith. May they have courage and confidence to hand on their gifts of experience and knowledge, of stories, memories, and counsel. Bless them with length of days and great joy."

The entire community was then invited to enjoy a Fellowship Celebration with refreshments and, of course, ice cream and cake!



Holy Trinity Uses The Senses To Enhance The Liturgy

Every Sunday morning from October 15 to November 5, Holy Trinity presented a series of Sunday Short Studies before the start of the Divine Liturgy in the church's sanctuary. The sessions were led and facilitated by Emily and Dn. Armen Terjimanian. The subject of the interactive talks focuses on Sensing God: Using the five human senses to tune in closer to God's presence while participating in worship during Badarak or any other Armenian Church service in a sanctuary.

The short study topics included Seeing God (what draws our eyes during the Badarak?); Hearing God's Word (How do all the sounds in the sanctuary from chanting sharagans to shaking kshots on the altar contribute to our experience of God?); Tasting Goodness (What does the smell of incense and the taste of Holy Communion move our minds?); and Feeling God's Presence (What do we physically touch during Badarak and how does that shape our prayer experience?). "It was exciting to lead a discussion on how we utilize our senses during prayer and especially during Badarak," said Emily and Dn. Armen. "To see the participants realize how the different ways they see, hear, smell, touch, and taste during services every Sunday in the sanctuary hopefully will draw them closer to the Lord.



Far/Ayo! Visits Cheltenham

On December 17 th, the Holy Trinity family, led by Rev. Fr. Hakob Gevorgyan, welcomed Sarah Stites who has been visiting parishes in our Diocese to inform and update how FAR/Ayo! Are helping the people in our homeland. She came prepared with a power point presentation, which enabled the viewers to see real people, hear their story and learn how they are being helped in many varied ways, while helping to promote the country's sustainable development.

Sarah Stites is the Development Officer for Fund for Armenian Relief's Ayo! program. Originally from the D.C. area, Sarah decided to say "Ayo!" to Armenia five years ago and hasn't looked back. Since 2018, she has learned Armenian, became a dual citizen and bought an apartment in Gyumri. Sarah is a remarkable young woman who said that she is "25%" Armenian through



her maternal grandfather who died before she was born. Her faith and her compassion for the Armenian people knows no bounds.

We learned that soldiers who were injured in the many wars often could not return to their former occupation, but were guided by FAR who helped to provide opportunities for them in another field, and ones that made them feel productive and valued. At the same times, there are over 100 thousand people who need our help desperately.

FAR also has been providing grants to help people open their own business, often in a new profession in order to accommodate the injuries they suffered. Another support is the opportunities that have been provided for young people with special needs, such as the opening of Armenia's first bakery to employ people with disabilities.

Sarah shared the "lesson from carpets." When we look at the underside, it looks like a jumble of various colored threads - worthless, but when we turn the rug over, we see how it all comes together to create a beautifully finished product.

The response of the Cheltenham parish was the total quiet as they watched, heard and understood the great need that FAR has to continue with their mission... and the checkbooks were opened generously from our parishioners and church organizations!


